## GRANT ROBERTS RESIGNS

Grant Roberts, of Frankfort, brother of Samuel Judson Roberts, founder of the Lexington Leader, has tendered his resignation as stamp deputy at Frankfort, the announcement of his withdrawal from the service of Uncle Sam being made by Collector Ben Marshall Wednesday. Mr. Roberts has moved to Cincinnati and established himself in business there. Mr. Roberts had been in the revenue service for twenty years.

## PLAN DRY KENTUCKY

Prohibitionists Declare Nearly 2,000 Drinking Places Will Be Closed. —Brewers Alarmed.

(Times-Star.) Cincinnati brewers and distillers will lose probably more than a million dollars of Kentucky business annually, owing to the passage of the Frost county local option bill by the Kentucky Legislature Tuesday. There now are 3,065 liquor licenses, including those given drug stores, granted in Kentucky. Samuel Propst, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon league for Southern Ohio, who is co-operating with the Kentucky league, estimates that under the new local option law this number of licenses will be cut in half.

Mr. Propst also announced Wednesday that steps would be taken at once for holding a local option election in Campbell County, Ky., to drive out the 151 saloons there.

"Kentucky today has 99 'dry' and 21 'wet' counties, but in a little while at least fourteen of the 'wet' counties may be 'dry,'" said Mr. Propst. "In each of these fourteen counties there is only one municipality with saloons, so it will easily be seen that the outlook for the 'drys' is very good. Kentucky may be said to be 75 per cent. 'wet' and 25 per cent. 'dry'."

"A recent investigation showed that there are 40,000,000 gallons of surplus whisky in Kentucky distilleries and warehouses. The distillers, anxious to get rid of this, have been carrying a plan of reducing their output. But it is now safe to predict that they will not be able to decrease this surplus. Under the old local option law 25 per cent. of the voters of every precinct in a county was needed to call an election. Under the new law 25 per cent. of the entire vote of the county, no matter from what precincts they are secured, is needed, and thus the holding of local option elections is greatly facilitated."

It became known Wednesday that the "drys" of Campbell County already have plans under way for holding an election under the new law, with the view of wiping out the saloons of Newport, Bellevue, Dayton and other towns. There are 100 saloons in Newport and 51 in other parts of the county. No movement for an election in Kenton County has been inaugurated.

The total expenditures for building at eighty cities of the United States in February, according to Bradstreet's, was \$28,808,822, a gain of six per cent. over last month, but a decrease of twenty-five per cent. from February, 1913.

## "PURE CONFISCATION"

Says Newport Brewer of Proposed Legislation.

The news of the passage of the Frost bill together with the prediction that the entire State of Kentucky will be made "dry" by the probable passage of the State-wide prohibition measure, Thursday, has caused alarm in the Kentucky brewing and distilling industries. Charles Wiedemann, president of the Wiedemann Brewing company, Newport, said, Wednesday morning: "This is the work of the minority. The legitimate brewing and distilling interests of the State are now seriously menaced and threatened with utter and complete confiscation. This will result if the State-wide prohibition bill becomes law. It was recently done in West Virginia, and the breweries and distilleries were simply given until July to close up their plants. "This is pure confiscation of property. For years the State gave licenses to those in the brewing business, and thus encouraged citizens to put money in these enterprises. Now at a blow they propose to take all this away from men who have devoted their lives to their business. I can not see how any American with a sense of fair dealing would lend his approval to such a deliberate plan of confiscation of property."


