SIX YEARS AGO TODAY

Since April 1st Cloudburst at Maysville—\$50,000 Damage Done—Two Drowned.

Today is a memorable day, as it is the sixth anniversary of the cloudburst in this city and county, which event happened about 1:30 p. m., causing rivers of muddy water to sweep down on the city from the hills above, flooding scores of homes and causing nearly \$50,000 damages to property.

Mr. and Mrs. Sant Brooks' home in West Third street was gutted and many others suffered.

Two persons were drowned in Lawrence Creek, when their home was swept away.

In front of The Ledger office the street was like a running river and skiffs could have easily been navigated. Rains Brothers, grain dealers, were the heaviest losers, their losses totaling \$7,000.

It was a most notable day for many things.
