IT WAS CIRCUS DAY

It was circus day in Maysville yesterday and there were thousands of people in town and everything was going off pleasantly until the rain began to come down in torrents, but not until after the parade at past 11 a. m. and after dinner when the big white tops were crowded with 5,000 anxious Americans who were hungry for the old time circus with twentieth century trappings, just such as the Robinson's know how to put together.

The street parade was a glorious and glittering menage from end to end. The chariots, the horses, the elephants, the bands and the galaxy of females, etc., all made up the street spectacle that filled the long felt want in the minds and hearts of an expectant public.

One Fourth street little boy was terribly indignant that God permitted it to rain, and remarked to his mother, "God made it rain on purpose." She said, "You mustn't say that." "Well, He did and He did it because we all wanted to go," he cried.

Of course God made the Weather Man and the Weather Man has it in for Maysville on all circus days, and so the bad man in this particular instance was the guy who pulled the ropes and made the deluge pour down from the skies.

To rub it in on those who had made arrangements to attend the night performance, and there were at least 5,000 of them, the Robinson management disgusted with the ocean of water and sea of mud in and around their tents and wagons on the old ball park canceled the evening show and pulled down the tents and the whole dinged copoodle and loaded them on their big special train and moved on to Covington where the big circus is billed to exhibit today.
