Williamsburg Man Succeeds Him As Deputy Marshal.

United States Marshal Ford Tuesday announced the appointment of Thomas Arthur of Williamsburg, Whitley County, as a deputy in his office to take the place of Emmett Orr, who resigned. Mr. Orr has been office deputy in Covington since the Eastern district was created. He had charge of the criminal docket and exercised supervision of the field deputy's accounts.

WAR SITUATION

Niagara Falls, Ont., May 20.—Stimulus was given today to the report that by self elimination General Huerta would make it possible for the mediation conference here to bring about peace in Mexico. It was announced that the provisional President had authorized his representatives to present his resignation if such a step became necessary to adjustment of the trouble. Later, however, it was stated that there had been an error of transmission and Huerta had said merely that his delegates have no instructions to offer his resignation.

Notwithstanding the fact that confirmation could not be given to earlier reports that General Huerta would not allow his incumbency of the office to stand in the way of the solution, the first day's session developed a feeling of optimism.
