Frankfort, Ky., May 22.—The C. & O. Northern with headquarters at Maysville and capitalized at \$50,000, filed articles of incorporation here today.

It proposes to build a line from the mouth of Tygart Creek, Greenup County, to Columbus, Ohio.

The incorporators are George W. Stevens, Deatur Axtell, M. J. Caples, W. D. Cochran, Henry Bannan, Lee Wright Browning.

The road will cross the Ohio River at Portsmouth and pass through Scioto, Pike, Ross and Pleasantry counties.

Stevens, Axtell and Caples live in Richmond, Va.; Whitaker, Cincinnati; Cochran and Browning, Maysville, and the company is capitalized at \$50,000.00 and is authorized to carry an indebtedness of \$15,000.00.

When completed the structural steel and concrete bridge that is to span the Ohio River at Portsmouth is to represent an outlay of \$2,000,000. Bids for its construction are to be opened in New York on Tuesday, June 11.

BRADLEY DEAD

Kentucky Senator and Republican War Horse Yields to Grim Destroyer

Kentucky Mourns for Brilliant Son—Burial at Frankfort Cemetery Tomorrow



Washington, May 23.—United States Senator William O'Connell Bradley, of Kentucky, seriously ill for the past three days at his apartments in this city died tonight at 9:45 o'clock after a day in which hope in the morning for an improvement in his condition was rapidly dispelled by a sinking spell which quickly sapped the vitality of the distinguished Kentuckian. His fatal illness was short, though he had been ailing for some time, and was due to a fall he sustained a few days ago.

The condition of the Senator took a decided turn for the worse this morning after a rally yesterday that gave hope to those at the bedside that he might recover. At 3 o'clock this afternoon, however, members of the household at the bedside had given up hope and all they hoped for at that time was that he might recover consciousness long enough to recognize them before he passed into the sleep that knows no waking.

Senator Bradley returned from Kentucky only last week after a trip made to his home State at the solicitation of friends who were urging him to make the race again for the Senate. He declined. His last speech was made in the Senate May 6, when he opposed the repeal of the exemption of American coastwise vessels from the payment of tolls through the Panama Canal.

Senator Bradley's body will be taken Monday to Frankfort, Ky., where funeral services will be held Tuesday afternoon from the home of his daughter, Mrs. John G. South. The body will be accompanied by committees from both Houses of Congress, to be appointed by Speaker Clark and Vice President Marshall.

Native of Garrard County. Senator Bradley was born near Lancaster, Garrard County, March 18, 1847. He was educated in the public and private schools of the community, never having attended college. At the age of 14 he ran away from school to join the Union army and did join it twice, but was taken from the army by his father because of his youthfulness.

He was elected a page in the Kentucky Legislature in 1861. In 1865, by special act of the Legislature, he was licensed to practice law. The bill providing that he might be so licensed if found competent by two Circuit Judges. Since that time, when he was only 18 years old, Senator Bradley had been active in the practice of law in both State and Federal courts in Kentucky, in the United States Circuit Court of Appeals and in the Supreme Court of the United States.

Married at Age of Twenty. Senator Bradley was married July 11, 1867, to Margaret Robertson Duncan. Three years later he was elected County Attorney in a district that was hopelessly Democratic. In 1887 he was nominated for Governor by the Republicans and cut down the Democratic majority that year to 17,000. In 1895 he was again nominated for Governor and

was elected by a majority of 8,912. Four years, before his successful race for the Senate he had been nominated and voted for by the Republican members of the Legislature. In February, 1908, he was elected to the Senate by a Legislature that was Democratic on joint ballot by eight majority, four Democrats, Charlton, McNutt, Mueller and Lillard, joining with the Republicans to bring about his election.

McCREARY MAY LEAVE STATE

And Be Appointed Senator By Lieutenant Governor. Frankfort, Ky., May 23.—It is reported here tonight that Governor Jas. B. McCreary has made arrangements to leave himself appointed United States Senator to succeed Senator Bradley. It was reported that the Governor will leave the State on "important business," leaving Lieutenant Governor McDermott in charge. McDermott, being Acting Governor then will appoint McCreary senator, it is reported. Johnston Camden, of Versailles, has been mentioned here as a possible successor to Senator Bradley.

MAYSVILLE BANK MUST PAY

To Augusta Depository \$375 as Result of Check Forgery. Frankfort.—The Appellate Court decided that the Farmers and Traders' Bank of Maysville, must pay to the Farmers' National Bank, of Augusta, \$375 paid by the Maysville bank on a check forged on the Augusta bank.

The check was paid by the Maysville bank February 5, 1913, to a man representing himself to be Fred Schatzman. The check was drawn on the Augusta bank, and the name signed was "James Ware." The Maysville bank forwarded the check to the Fifth Third National Bank, of Cincinnati, its collecting agent. The Cincinnati bank forwarded the check to the Augusta bank.

James Ware kept his account in the Augusta bank in the name of James Ware, Agent. The word "agent" was not on the check, but was added to it by the cashier. When Ware received his checks he discovered the forgery. Before the Maysville bank forwarded the check to the Cincinnati bank it stamped on the check, "Guaranteed all prior endorsements." The Court says that the general rule is that the bank is bound to know the signatures of its depositors, and when it pays a check it admits the genuineness of the signature.

In conclusion the Court holds that the Augusta bank may recover the money paid under mistake of the Cincinnati bank, and that the money paid by the Maysville bank cannot be recovered by it.
