ALL BIDS ON THE MATHEWS PROPERTY REJECTED.

Four pieces of real estate belonging to W. B. Mathews were offered for sale yesterday afternoon. The first piece, the frame tobacco warehouse on the corner of Bank and Second streets was started at \$2000 and went to \$2600 and was rejected at those figures.

It was stated that \$2750 would buy the property at that time.

Leading Churchmen of Lexington Organized in Attendance Upon 19th Annual Meeting.

The Nineteenth Annual Council of the Diocese of Lexington met at Christ Church Cathedral in that city at 11 o'clock Wednesday morning when joint Corporate Holy Communion for the Diocesan Council and the Woman's Auxiliary was administered by the Rt. Rev. Lewis W. Burton, D. D., Bishop of the Diocese. The services were followed by a meeting of the Cathedral Chapter luncheon served by the women of the congregation at 1 o'clock and the organization of the council at 2:30 o'clock after which Bishop Burton delivered his annual address and report and Miss Helen H. Turner, of Knoxville, vice president of the Girls' Friendly Society in America, addressed the council.

The day's work was concluded with a meeting held in the evening in the interest of Religious Education, at which Archdeacon F. B. Wentworth, visitor of St. John's Home Training School, Corbin, Ky., and the Rev. J. M. Maxon, president of Margaret College, Versailles, Ky., delivered the addresses.

Today's session marks the principal business of the council.

The much-discussed steamer Steel City arrived at Point Pleasant, W. Va., Monday from Rochester, where she has been laid up for the past four months. She is now laid up in the Kanawha River, alongside her sister steamer, Queen City.

Pittsburg, Pa.—With the arrival of the hot weather the rivers have started to fall, and the United States engineers at the locks and dams are busily engaged in raising the wickets to enable the packets and other river craft to continue their trips. A number of tow boats are being held down the Ohio until the up-river dams can be raised and a nine-foot stage secured.

Will Be Dover's New K. of P. Hall—Maysville Knights to Attend.

 The painting of the iron front of the K. of P. building was completed this week and everything is now in readiness for the dedication exercises Thursday night. Grand Keeper of Records and Seals, J. W. Carter, of Lexington Grand Inner Guard, Aubrey Barbour, of Newport, and Grand Vice Chancellor, Sherman Arn, of Maysville, are three of the Grand Officers almost sure to take part in the services, and other Grand Officers have been invited. Many members of neighboring lodges will be present and take part.

The dedication ceremony will be held in the new Castle Hall, and will be open to the public.

After the dedication the lodge will go into session and the First Rank will be conferred on new applicants for membership.
