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THE CARD SYSTEM FOR DRINKERS.

Granted one is a regular user of intoxicants in Columbus, Ohio, he may some day get a card from the proprietor of his favorite place which reads something like this:

"I have been notified by your wife, father, mother, etc., not to sell you any intoxicating liquor. If I or my employees know you they will refuse to sell you or to permit any other person to buy intoxicants for you. It will therefore be both a kindness to me and to yourself if you will not come to my place of business, as thus I will be spared the necessity of refusing and you the humiliation of being refused."

At the same time the proprietor will send to the protesting informant another card requesting the photograph of the person who is to be denied intoxicants. The cards are to go by registered mail.

The plan, formed by the saloon keepers of Youngstown, Ohio, is being adopted in other parts of the State to combat the activities of busybodies, who are said to be laying the foundation for law suits by serving notices not to sell to certain persons. After the notices have been given the statute authorizes recovery of damages. The move is also regarded by the State License Board as a means of creating trouble for the license system.

A HALF-AND-HALF PARTY.

BILLION FOR GOOD ROADS

May Be Raised By State Bonds Guaranteed By Government.

Washington.—One billion dollars, to be raised by the sale of state bonds guaranteed by the Federal Government, will be spent for good roads if a bill which will be favorably reported to the Senate by the Postoffice and Post Roads Committee this week is passed.

Casting aside the Shackelford bill, which has already passed the House, the Senate Post Roads Committee, it was learned, has practically agreed to report out a measure along the lines proposed by former Senator Jonathan Bourne, of Oregon.

Despite the scolding at its financial methods, the plan has won the approval of Senator John W. Weeks, of Massachusetts, and many other Senators on the Post Roads Committee, among whom is Senator Bryan of Florida, a prominent member of the Senate Committee on Appropriations.

"SUCKER LIST"

Worth Money to Swindlers—New Yorker Tells How He Makes Easy Living in the City.

"I have a list of 100,000 names and every person on it is a 'sucker,'" The individual who spoke was a well-dressed individual who made his headquarters in the lobby of one of the hotels. "And out of those names I make my living. This may seem strange to you but the day of the 'sucker' has not passed. Only the other day we read that the Goudorf gang had fished more than \$50,000 from a fellow by the time-worn racehorse swindle."

When asked where he found a market for the "sucker" list he added: "I sell those lists of suckers to dealers, charging so much per thousand names. No matter how shady the scheme may be that you are floating there are always somewhere suckers to take it up. I sell the dealers the names and addresses of these suckers. And I am continually gathering names of new suckers. Do you realize now how valuable my sucker list is?"

"Nearly every person in the world is a sucker in something. I myself fall for the health game, and I pride myself on knowing all the angles to 'soft' money business I will buy any new preparation for the cure or aid of indigestion. There are millions of persons who await eagerly any new hair tonic and the like number of women who wait impatiently for new massage cream. I have a list of more than 50,000 of these women."

"How could fake health doctors exist if they didn't keep adding to their new 'comeon' lists? They have health compounds that may be made for \$1 a barrel and sold for \$1 a bottle. These houses keep well-tabulated lists and files of letters from persons who promise to be productive. Some of these letters are ten or twelve years old and in which the sucker described his ailment. He is circularized. When the answer comes, the ten-year-old letter furnishes the diagnosis of the case; after that he is fairly easy to land."

"Just think of the numerous newspaper stories of men who have fallen for the gold mine game. Why," he continued, "if you have any scheme for which you need names to fill the stock come to me and let me sell you my list of every waiting person. I'll guarantee you they are all good biters."
