WILSON EXPRESSES WISH That Mason and Dixon Line Forever Be Forgotten.

Washington.—President Wilson expressed the wish that the Mason and Dixon line forever be forgotten. In a letter to President B. H. Joy, of the Lincoln Highway Association, asking that the road run from Philadelphia to Gettysburg, through Washington, the President suggested that would be a good means of further obliterating sectional feeling between the North and the South.

The President's letter was as follows: "I am sure that the entire country is interested to see to it that there should no longer exist a North or a South in this absolutely united country, which we all love, and that the Mason and Dixon line should be made once and for all a thing of the past, and as a small contribution to that end I earnestly suggest that the Lincoln Highway Association should grant permission to place the official Lincoln Highway markers on the roadway from Philadelphia to Washington, through the properly selected streets of the latter city to the Lincoln Monument and from there to Gettysburg."

BURLEY MEN SILENT ON POOLING QUESTION

Officials and Attorneys of Society Prefer to Read It Before Commenting.



Officials and attorneys of the Burley Tobacco Company and of the Burley Tobacco Society declined to comment Tuesday, upon the possible effect of the decision of the Supreme Court of the United States knocking out the Kentucky tobacco pooling law. President LeBus referred inquiring newspaper men to Colonel John R. Allen, chief counsel for the company. Colonel Allen saw no immediate effect of the decision would have and Henry T. Duncan, also of counsel for the company, preferred to await a reading of the decision before expressing an opinion.

Prof. J. D. Clark, manager of the Burley Tobacco Warehouse here, said that he would first have to see a copy of the decision, as the newspaper reports were conflicting. One story had it that the clause providing for the forfeiture of 20 per cent. of the value of the crop was illegal, as the value of the tobacco could not be definitely determined, while another report stated that the pooling act was illegal, in which case a new act would have to be passed before a pool could be carried out under the former plans and conditions.

Cincinnati, June 24, 1914.
While the Reds failed to win a majority of their games on the Eastern trip just closed, they managed to remain in second place during their visit of nearly three weeks on the Atlantic seaboard, a result that many wise scribers predicted would not follow the tour. For the next few weeks the Reds will be here or hereabouts, and it is expected that during their performances in their own territory they will improve their percentage, even if they fail to go higher in the race than they are at present. Games with the Cubs are scheduled for this week, to be followed by a double header with the Pirates next Sunday, and several additional games next week. In their recent games with both these teams the Reds have more than held their own, indicating that the coming battles will result in an upward movement of Cincinnati stock.

Jack Johnson, late citizen of the United States, now residing permanently in France, will try to make the world's heavyweight championship a French possession on June 27, when he meets Frank Moran, of Pittsburg, in Paris. Some days later England will try to annex the lightweight championship by putting Freddie Welsh against Billy Ritchie. The date of this fight is set for July 7 to London. Then comes George Carpentier, the French heavyweight champion, on July 16, to mix it up with Gunboat Smith, the premier honors of England and France, garnered by Carpentier, being at stake. Altogether Uncle Sam has much to battle for in these fights—and it is hoped he'll be more successful than he was in the golf and polo tournaments played recently with English teams.

More owners who race for sport and fewer who are in the business for gain are noted on the big eastern tracks, giving promise of so healthy a revival of the "sport of kings," that the crowds of years ago will be repeated within a few years, and that, too, with a higher class of patronage and less prospect of turf scandals. Locally racing is enjoying a good season, the crowds at Latonia being of goodly size, enthusiastic and inclined to bet. The only drawback to the meeting so far has been the shyness of owners to start their horses in the big handicaps, none of which have brought out large fields.

SOCIETY IS OPPOSED TO BILLY SUNDAY AT DENVER, COLO.

Denver, Colo.—The Sacred Thirty Six, Denver's most prominent society folks, have expressed their intention of fighting the attempt to have Billy Sunday come to their city, build a tabernacle, and conduct a revival. They declared the revival was nuisance. Crawford Hill, whose wife is one of the prominent society women of Denver, filed a protest with the city building commission. The tabernacle would be built across the street from his home. He said the meetings would raise a general disturbance, and that dust would be blown into the residences nearby. If the tabernacle is built, an injunction will be filed by the society.
