NEW HIGH ALTAR

Dedicated Yesterday in St. Patrick Church—Rev. Father Gorey, Chancellor of the Diocese, in Charge

Church Now Magnificent in Beautiful Art Glass Windows and Interior Fittings

Sunday morning at 7 o'clock the Rev. Father Gorey, Chancellor of the Diocese of Covington, with all the beautiful, elaborate and symbolic ritual of the Roman Catholic faith, dedicated the new altar of St. Patrick's Church.

Recently, not only has St. Patrick's been beautified by the installation of three new altars, magnificent examples of the florid gothic style, made in Austria of valuable wood, enameled in white, gold and the richest of colors, but it has been rendered magnificent by two new windows of art glass, as gloriously colored as a sunset sky.

These windows are probably unrivalled in this country. They are the work of Mr. Alberts of Louisville, a graduate of Munich, Bavaria, and a master of his craft.

People of Maysville desiring to experience that peculiar exaltation of mind attainable only in the indescribable atmosphere of a great church, need no longer travel afar in search of the sensation. For St. Patrick's, though not large compared with some of the magnificent cathedrals monuments of mediæval genius gives the cathedral effect to perfection.

The west window which might be entitled the "Conversion of Ireland," was designed by Mr. Alberts from a brilliant conception of Fr. Jones, and represents St. Patrick, the Apostle of Ireland, on the hill of Tara, bringing home the doctrine of the trinity of God, to the Irish king, his family and courtiers, by means of a shamrock, plucked from the nearby sward.

The east window donated by German members, represents St. Boniface, patron of the Teutonic race, conveying the Germans. He has just cut down the mighty oak sacred to the terrible God, Thor, and is surrounded by an awe-struck crowd momentarily expecting him to be blasted by the wrath of the offended deity.

These windows were installed at a cost of fifteen hundred dollars each. They were designed for this church exclusively and will never be duplicated. The altars were put in at a total cost of \$3,000. Expensive, in sound, but artistic perfection well worth every dollar.

Not alone in the construction of the High Altar is to be found reminder that the congregation of St. Patrick's is composed of Americans whose birth or ancestry was in Erin or in Germany. The huge windows in the transept of the Church also bear evidence of reverence for each patron Saint of each Fatherland.

The glow of the morning sunlight on the eastern window lights up a scene of intense human interest, laid in the forest of Geismar near Fritzlar, when...

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JAPAN ENTERS

War Arena By Sending Ultimatum to Germany

Millions Lining Up on German-French Frontier for Tremendous Death Struggle

Great Britain Quietly Taking Full Possession of the High Seas

LATEST WAR BULLETINS

While the German forces are pushing forward through the valley of the Meuse, and still more extensive operations are in progress along the Alsace-Lorraine frontier, where the French and Germans are in contact, Japan has sent an ultimatum to Germany demanding the withdrawal of the German warships from the Orient and the evacuation of Kian Chan, a German protectorate in China.

This territory comprises an area of 200 square miles with 200 square miles in the bay. Tsing-Tau, the seat of the government of the territory is the port where the German warships mobilized at the outbreak of hostilities.

Japan's ultimatum gives Germany until August 23 to comply with the demand. Owing to cable interruption however, Japan has not been able to deliver the ultimatum to Germany and it is announced that the United States will undertake this task.

Peking reports that three British regiments have been ordered to hold themselves in readiness to go aboard transports and it is presumed they will co-operate with the Japanese land forces.

In Tokio the Japanese ultimatum has created a great impression and the Japanese Premier and Foreign minister have counselled the Japanese to maintain a calm attitude.

Late dispatches report an offensive movement by the French from Lunville to Saarburg, but this is considered as merely an outpost affair. A state of siege has been proclaimed in Bulgaria.

London, August 16, 11 p. m.—Despite the recent repulses which they have suffered, the Germans continue to go forward for a decisive engagement, which can not be delayed much longer. While there has been a lull in the fighting in Belgium, the invaders are sweeping along the valley of the Meuse south of Namur and have reached Dinant where a part of a strong French force is established behind the town that took the defensive and defeated them.

Washington, August 16.—The Japanese Ambassador, Baron Chinda, tonight delivered to Secretary Bryan the written announcement of Japan that an ultimatum had been addressed to Germany requesting the latter's withdrawal from China. At the same time he communicated the assurance of Japan to the United States that the utmost endeavor would be exercised to safeguard the interests of this country and all others not immediately concerned in the present war.

The United States, it became known after Baron Chinda's call on Mr. Bryan, does not intend to be drawn in any way into the controversy, regarding it as a matter purely between Germany and Japan. The American Government considers satisfactory the promise of Japan of "eventual restoration to China" of the territory of Kian Chan.

Pope Orders Prayers for Cessation of War.

Rome, Aug. 15.—This being Assumption day in all the 400 churches of Rome, special prayers were offered, by direct instructions of the Pope, for the cessation of the war.

The pontiff himself, after celebrating mass in his private chapel, in the presence of his sisters and niece and his entourage, prayed at length for the prevention of further bloodshed staining his pontificate.

BECKHAM'S PLURALITY

6,806 OVER STANLEY

Official Primary Returns Are Announced by Kentucky Election Board.

Frankfort, Ky., Aug. 15.—Official primary returns given out tonight by the State Election Board show that former Governor J. C. W. Beckham received a plurality of 6,806 over Congressman A. O. Stanley, former Governor A. G. Wilson was the long-term Republican nominee, while W. Marshall Bullitt won the Republican nomination for the short term in the Senate.

The figures follow: Democratic—Long term: Beckham, 72,677; Stanley, 65,871; McCreary, 20,257. Short term: Camden, 73,850; Young, 34,363; Smith, 18,415. Republican—Long term: Wilson, 28,311; Ernst, 21,924; Fitzgerald, 2,910. Short term: Bullitt, 27,013; McLaughlin, 10,816.

The result for congressional nomination: Ninth District—Democrat: Field, 12,903; Haney, 2,997; Young, 1,216; Haley, 772; Perry, 298. Republican: Osborne, 2,107; Ireland, 1,929.
