GERMANS TO STORM ANTWERP

London, England, Oct. 7.—1:45 A. M.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Antwerp gives the following official communication issued at 10 o'clock Tuesday:

"The military government has informed the burgomaster that a bombardment of Antwerp is imminent and that the people who want to flee from the town are requested to leave."

"The bombardment will have no influence on the town's resistance, which will be pushed to the extreme limit."

Paris, France, Oct. 6.—11:50 P. M.—The French War Office tonight made public the following official communication:

"The characteristics of the situation continue the same. On our left wing to the north of the River Oise, the action has grown more and more violent."

"A little ground has been gained in the northern part of the heights of the Meuse."

Warsaw Becomes a Dry City. London, England, Oct. 6.—A Warsaw dispatch to the Reuter Telegram Company says the sale of spirits and wine is prohibited, even in first class restaurants, hotels and clubs and that Warsaw is now a completely dry city.

For Relief of Antwerp. Paris, October 6.—Gen. Joffre today took steps to relieve Antwerp by ordering the moving of the allies' line to the north and directing a new attack in the direction of Mons to engage the German right and center. The information was made public after an official word was received from Antwerp, declaring that the situation was serious and unless the allies gave aid quickly the city would fall.

RETURNED HOME AFTER BEING ORDERED FROM PARIS

MRS. BUCKNER WALLINGFORD RETURNED FROM STRICKEN EUROPE.

Mrs. Buckner Wallingford, sister of former Congressman Nicholas Longworth, returned to Cincinnati Monday after an exciting time in France. She, with her mother, Mrs. Nicholas Longworth, Sr., and her sister, the Comtesse de Chambrun, saw the German airplanes in flight over Paris, and heard the gunners on Eiffel tower firing at the birds-of-war. A week or so before the outbreak of the war, Mrs. Wallingford, who had been traveling in Europe, arrived at the home of her sister, the Comtesse de Chambrun, in St. Mihiel, near the German border. It finally became so unsafe there that it was decided to leave and take refuge in Paris. The wounded soldiers, seen by the Cincinnatians, exhibited great courage. Every woman Mrs. Wallingford knew in St. Mihiel had lost some relative in the war, husband, brother, father or son. The Comte de Chambrun is at the front with his regiment and in his last letter told of being exposed to the rain for days, and of not having an opportunity to take off his shoes for ten days. Mrs. Nicholas Longworth, Sr., is now in Normandy.
