"SCATTER SALLEE"

Base Ball Hero Returns Home With New Wife, Wealth and Other Useful Trucks and Many Trunks.

The waiting room of the C. & O. Depot at Augusta was fairly well-filled Saturday with belongings of Harry F. Sallee, the well-known left-hander of the St. Louis National team, shipped here from St. Louis by express, the charges on some amounting to more than \$25. Besides two or three large and heavy trunks, "Scatter" had several other smaller packages, one large coffin-shaped box, on which he placed a valuation of \$325, a musical instrument of some kind. We are told that Harry came through from St. Louis in an automobile which he purchased during the past summer, and we also learn that since he married he purchased a good farm near his home town of Higginsport, and that he will add to his real estate possessions this fall by purchasing a good-sized farm adjoining his own land, all of which comes from the skill of his left arm.

The following dispatch from Ripley, Ohio, appeared in last Sunday's Enquirer, and after reading it one is forced to believe that Dale Smith, catcher for Augusta in that game, either has an ivory head or the Ripley correspondent is "stretching the blanket" in this instance.

"Slim" Sallee, the crack pitcher of the St. Louis National League team, hails from Higginsport, Ohio, and the natives of that city and surrounding county tell many a funny story on his early days as an amateur ball player. Harry Tyler, a railroad man who is also known as "umpire," tells this story on "Slim," whose nickname among the home folk was "Scatter." It was on Decoration Day, and Higginsport was to play Augusta, Ky. Tyler says that when the game was about to start it was discovered that the Higginsport pitcher was missing. Howard Nestor, manager of the Higginsports, hurriedly scouted around for a substitute and found "Scatter" sitting on a soap box in front of a livery barn.

He brought him out on the diamond on his shirt sleeves and a pair of rough linen "breeches" which did not reach to the top of his everyday shoes by fully six inches.

But "Scatter" went right at it, and all he did was to use straight balls, but they had speed enough on them to make them "look like peas." And he easily won the game.

Dale Smith came to bat for Augusta and Sallee shot in a very hot one, which Smith struck at and missed. It evidently had a curve to it and was a high inshoot, as it hit Smith squarely in the middle of the forehead, bounced up in the air and Higginsport's first baseman ran in and caught it, thus putting out the side and winning the game. Smith was only slightly stunned. For two or three years after this Sallee worked as pitcher for Georgetown, and his rapid improvement soon attracted the attention of the minor leagues.

LARGEST TOBACCO PLANT EVER GROWN.

Laneaster, Ky.—The tallest stalk of tobacco ever seen in this part of the State and probably the tallest ever grown anywhere, was raised by R. C. Pepper on a farm near Dix River, some six or seven miles from here. The stalk measured exactly ten feet in height, and although Mr. Pepper had not topped it, he cut from it ten large leaves of the finest texture. The tobacco grown by this planter is a cross between stand-up and white burley tobacco. He had in twenty acres last season, which yielded 1,500 pounds to the acre, and sold very high, paying about \$450 an acre. The tall stalk was grown in new land, and a number of others approached it in height. The mammoth stalk was taken to Lexington to be placed on exhibition.


