TREMENDOUS LOSSES

Telling on the Kaiser's Fighting Machine

Allies Slowly Drawing Circle of Doom Around Germany

GERMAN WOUNDED ARE BLOCKING FLANDERS ROADS.

Paris, Nov. 7.—The road from Bruges toward the east in the direction of Ghent, Brussels and Louvain has been blocked all day by great columns of German troops accompanied by artillery detachments and many ambulances transporting wounded. Antwerp, Brussels, Louvain Aix la Chapelle are filled with German wounded, and those now arriving at these places cannot be accommodated because of the lack of hospital facilities and the inadequacy of the attendance corps.

The Germans are reported throwing up earthworks twenty miles in the rear of their position in Flanders in readiness for retreat.

HAMMERING TURKEY TO THE WORLD'S SATISFACTION

London, Nov. 7.—Russia is attacking Turkey with the greatest energy on land and sea. The preliminary battles have been won by the Russians, and the Czar's troops now occupy the larger part of northern Armenia.

A dispatch from Rome tonight states that in the region northeast of Erzurum the Russians have defeated three Turkish regiments and have a firm grip on Turkish territory. The town of Van, 140 miles southeast of Erzurum in Turkish Armenia, is being besieged by a force native to the country and under the leadership of Russian officers.

The population never content with Turkish rule, has seized the opportunity to revolt.

THE GERMANS LOST THE KEY TO CHINA WHEN THE BIG PORT FELL.

So far as actual hostilities go, the fall of Tsing-Tao ends the war in the far east. Japan declared war against Germany on August 23, and immediately began preparations to attack Tsing-Tao. The little German garrison resisted stoutly, but could not hope to hold it against the overwhelming odds opposing them.

With the capture of Tsing-Tao by allied Anglo-Japanese army, Germany is now deprived of all her Asiatic possessions. The German prisoners who were taken when the fortress surrendered, are being placed upon transports and will probably be interned in southern Japan.

COME-BACK

Of Republican Party in West Virginia Is Surprise To G. O. P. Leaders.

Charleston, W. Va., Nov. 7.—Standing out prominently as features of the election in West Virginia on last Tuesday was the "come-back" of the Republican party in capturing complete control of both branches of the State's Legislature and the election of former Representative Adam B. Littlepage in the Third Congressional District over Captain S. B. Avis, his Republican opponent.

The election demonstrated that under appropriate normal conditions West Virginia is safely Republican.

MRS. DESHA BRECKINRIDGE

Elected President of Kentucky Suffragists—Will Demand Votes For Women From Legislature.

Owensboro, Ky., Nov. 7.—The delegates at the meeting of the Kentucky Equal Rights Association marched through the streets of Owensboro this afternoon with banners and flags flying. They were chanting the suffragette anthem to the tune of "America."

Miss Laura Clay, a pioneer in the cause of suffrage, marched at the head of the parade with five other delegates.

The association went on record today in favor of calling on the Kentucky General Assembly in 1916 for votes for women in this state. Resolutions also were adopted favoring world-wide peace, and calling for better laws governing the working conditions of women and children.

It was decided to give half of the collections taken up at the Owensboro meeting to the Belgian Relief Fund for the widows and orphans in Belgium.

President, Mrs. Desha Breckinridge, of Lexington; First Vice President, Mrs. Edward L. Hutchinson, of Lexington; Second Vice President, Mrs. Charles Firth, of Lexington; Third Vice President, Mrs. J. D. Hayes, of Owensboro; Corresponding Secretary, Miss Laura Clay, of Lexington; Recording Secretary, Mrs. Robinson A. McDowell, of Louisville; Treasurer, Mrs. Jacob Judah, of Louisville; Auditor, Mrs. Julia Henning, of Louisville; State Member of the Executive Committee, Mrs. Thomas Smith, of Frankfort.

The session closed tonight with an address by Rabbi Pineschreiber, of Memphis, Tenn.

FIRE DESTROYS 30 ACRES OF KANSAS CITY STOCK PENS.

Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 7.—A fire that burned fiercely for several hours early today swept over the Kansas City stock yards and destroyed thirty acres of pens, covering a third of the cattle section of the yards. The loss was \$125,000.
