To Help Little Belgians—The "Children's Little Belgian Society of Central Kentucky To Be a Great Success

(Lexington Leader.)

DURING THE COMING WINTER

One million little Belgians will be homeless.
One million little Belgians will be hungry.
One million little Belgians will have no shoes.
One million little Belgians will have ragged clothes.
One million little Belgians will have no fire.

It is a "go."
The names and the dime and the quarter—and some big, round dollars—began to roll in yesterday before one would think that The Leader had commenced its daily journey into the charitable homes of the bluegrass.

The membership fee, remember, is ten cents for children up to fifteen years old.

No child over fifteen years old is eligible to regular membership.

O, yes. Children older than that can join also, but they must come in as Honorary Members and will not be permitted to do any of the work of the Society except to pay dues.

The fee for honorary membership is 25 cents. Children aged from 15 to 90 are eligible for honorary membership.

These membership fees make the applicants life members.

Purpose of the Society.
As explained yesterday in The Leader, the purpose of the Children's Little Belgian Society is to raise a fund for the benefit of the Little Belgians.

That is why it is called the Children's Little Belgians Society. It is for the benefit of the LITTLE Belgians—the poor little folk who will be cold, and hungry, and sad during the long winter nights which are to come over their devastated country in a short time.

The big Belgians who are in trouble can sort of hustle for themselves, but it is the little Belgians who are in the most trouble.

Hundreds of thousands of them will be in need of everything which makes a boy or a girl comfortable. There must be medicine for the sick little Belgians, and food for the little mothers who have whole families of little Belgians to look after.

Ten cents will feed one little Belgian for one day. That is the price of one "movie" ticket or two packages of chewing gum.

CHINESE BECOMING GREATER USERS OF TOBACCO PRODUCTS.

(Western Tobacco Journal.)

A comparison of the Tobacco imports into China during the years 1912 and 1913 taken from the Maritime Customs returns, shows how favorably the Chinese are taking to the Tobacco habit, especially to cigarettes.

In 1912 the cigarette imports into the Chinese Empire amounted to 4,339,82,000, while in the following year this total had jumped to 6,209,037,000, an increase of 1,869,255,000. Besides this the manufacture of native cigarettes has shown wonderful progress in the past few years. The cigar importation has not held pace with the smaller smokes; the totals for the two years being 38,638,000 and 38,565,000 or a slight decrease for 1913. Imports of raw tobacco for 1912 and 1913 were 19,057,466 pounds and 21,544,800 pounds, respectively, or a gain of 2,487,334 pounds.

The total value of all the tobacco imported into China in 1912, was \$9,055,512, as compared with \$12,130,817 in 1913, an increase of over three million dollars, or 34 per cent.

500,000 CHICKENS ON ONE FARM

"Mammoth poultry plants, like over-large soap bubbles, are generally short-lived, but there are exceptions. One of these is the Pittsfield Poultry Farm with headquarters in Maine, and a branch plant in Massachusetts.

"The maximum number of chickens produced by this plant and sold principally in the baby-chick stage, up the present year, has been half million chicks annually.

"Next year the owners, Messrs. F. W. Briggs, Gordon Dobson, and Howard Gilmore, are planning to increase the output of the plant to the two million chick mark. This plant has been in operation for eight years.—Farm and Fireside.

"MY OLD KENTUCKY HOME"

"Federal Hill," Near Bardstown, and Portrayal of Foster's Famous Melody, To Be Filmed for the Movies

The Karnix Movie Co., of Chicago, which has a branch office in Lexington just now, has secured the exclusive rights for a production of a motion picture play, "My Old Kentucky Home," on the ground where Stephen Foster wrote the immortal song.

The rights were secured, it became known, from Mrs. Madge R. Frost, the owner of Federal Hill, Nelson county, Ky., where the scene of the song was laid.

M. H. Karnes is president of the Karnix Movie Company and has been producing the local film "When the Tango Craze Hit Lexington." In connection with L. E. Mattingly he will start at once arranging for the production of the "Old Kentucky Home" film. Mr. Karnes said that the nation-wide popularity of the song would insure the success of the production, and that he intended to make it as artistically perfect as possible.

The film will be a triple exposure from start to finish, and with the services of W. Osborne Runcie at the camera, Mr. Karnes says that the picture should be a notable example of this difficult form of camera work.

Mr. Karnes is arranging with several well-known Kentuckians to take the various parts in the piece, and some of the old darlings on the original farm will appear in the scenes. Mrs. Frost has assured her co-operation in making the scenes historically accurate.

The scenario is nearly completed and still photos will be made of the scenes this week. The film will be developed in the laboratories of the American Film Company at Chicago and General Manager Neils has assured Mr. Karnes that the best color work possible will be accorded the film.

Mr. Karnes has established his branch here with five people and has several other developments in contemplation.
