## COURT OF APPEALS

Defines Authority of Agent of Common Carrier To Sell Ticket

FRANKFORT—Authority of an agent of a common carrier to sell a ticket for transportation on connecting roads "confers upon the agent power to bind the initial carrier by any assurances he made to the purchaser relating to the transportation contemplated by this ticket from the initial point to the place of destination," said the Court of Appeals in the case of Louisville & Nashville against Laura Sperling.

Mrs. Sperling bought a ticket for herself and children at Richmond to Parma, Mo., over the L. & N. to Louisville, the Illinois Central to Cairo, thence to Parma via the St. Louis and Southwestern. The agent at Richmond told her that he thought she could get through from Paducah to Cairo in spite of the high water then prevailing in April, 1912. She was stopped at Paducah and returned to Richmond. She sued for damages for the discomfort and illness occasioned by her experience and money loss and recovered \$1,052.85; but the Court of appeals reversed the judgement and she is entitled to recover for the cost of her ticket, loss and expenses back home.
