CREDITORS AFTER ALEXANDER'S LIFE INSURANCE.

Paris, Ky.—W. O. Hinton, assignee of George Alexander & Co. state bank, filed an amended petition against George Alexander, Alexander's wife and daughters and others, seeking to recover the cash surrender value of \$60,000 of insurance carried by Mr. Alexander. Forty thousand dollars of the insurance has been assigned to the different defendants and the remaining \$20,000 is made payable to several of the defendants, members of Alexander's family. The cash surrender value of the policies will be between \$30,000 and \$40,000, and if the suit of the assignee is won this sum will go for the benefit of Alexander's creditors.

OLYMPIC GAMES MAY TAKE PLACE IN AMERICA IN 1916.

Paris.—The Olympic games in 1916 may be held in the United States. FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE

Expert Diagnosis of Animal Malady Now Afflicting This Country Given By County Agent Casey.

For the information of the public County Agent A. M. Casey has requested us to publish the following: There is not a disease known that is more highly communicable from one subject to another than this one. The disease is transmitted by direct contact, and through the medium of infected food, litter, watering places, stables, cars and attendants. It is possible that the contagion may be carried short distances in the air. The period of incubation, or the time that elapses between exposure and signs of the development of the disease, is usually short, but may vary from 24 hours to 29 days. Most cases develop within two or three days after exposure.

Foot and mouth disease usually starts with a chill. The animal remains in the gait. The back is arched, the hair erect, flanks tucked up and there is shivering or twitching of the muscles. A sick animal moves with reluctance, and there is stiffness or marked lameness in the gait. A thick, yellowish secretion collects at the inner corners of the eyes, and about the edges of the nostrils. More active symptoms of the disease may be noticed by blisters which form in the mouth, about the feet and udder. The blisters vary in size from that of a pea to a quarter of a dollar, and are filled with watery fluid. There is a profuse salivary of the mouth; the saliva at first is normal, but later becomes thick and raspy.

This disease is not ordinarily fatal, but causes very serious loss in the checked milk flow and prolonged unthrifty condition, and seriously diseased feet. The mouth is so sore that the animal is unable to partake of solid food and apparently loses all sense of taste and is generally of no value thereafter. One attack of the disease does not confer immunity, as an animal may have it several times. Destruction of affected animals and thorough disinfection—these are the only methods that have ever been effective in dealing with this disease. Keep a watchful eye for this disease and let us work together to prevent an outbreak in this county.

WAR NEWS—THOUSANDS SLAIN WITHOUT DEFINITE RESULTS

40,000 AUSTRIANS BURIED IN GRAVE FOUR MILES LONG.

Amsterdam, November 17.—The Nieuwe Rotterdamse Courant quotes a letter from a Galician priest stating that 40,000 Austrians have been buried in one day in a grave six and one-half feet wide and a little more than four miles long. The bodies, the letter says, were laid next to each other in three layers. These men were killed, it is stated, during a battle lasting only a few hours.

'BOBS' TO REST IN ST. PAUL'S.

London, November 17.—In deference to the public wish the body of the late Earl Roberts will be laid to rest in St. Paul's Cathedral. He will be given a public funeral of an elaborate military character.

GERMANS' LOSS 100,000.

London.—Telegraphing from Dunkirk, France, the correspondent of the Daily Mail says: "There was heavy fighting around Ypres Monday. The casualties were large. The battle resulted in excellent progress for the allies. The German casualties are estimated at 100,000 in the past four days."

GENERAL JOFFRE HOLDS SECOND ARMY OF 3,000,000 IN RESERVE.

Paris.—The French army consists now of 3,000,000 men, but double that number. Of these 6,000,000, one-half has been under fire. The remaining 3,000,000 have not left their garisons. Very few people in France realize that General Joseph Joffre holds this tremendous army in reserve.

HEAVY LOSSES TELLING ON GERMANS.

There is evidence that the Germans are beginning to be affected by their heavy losses. Prisoners state that the young men of the new corps can not withstand the fatigues and privations of campaigning and the middle-aged men lack ardor.

HEIR TO ENGLAND'S THRONE JOINS THE COLORS IN FLANDERS.

London, November 17.—Tonight's London Gazette, the official court publication, announces that "Second Lieutenant Prince of Wales" has been appointed aide-de-camp on the staff of Sir John French.

TRYING TO CONQUER DREADED FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE

THOROUGHBREDS INFECTED. Spokane, Wash.—One hundred and one head of thoroughbred Holstein cattle, en route from Lake Mills, Wis., to Ray, Wash., were pronounced here by inspectors of the Federal Bureau of Animal Industry to be suffering from foot and mouth disease and were ordered killed. The shipment was valued at \$25,000.

MT. STERLING PENS CLOSED.

Mt. Sterling, Ky.—For the first time in the history of court days in Mt. Sterling no cattle were on the market in this city, owing to the quarantine now in force. Thousands of cattle that had been on the road from the mountains for days were refused admittance to the city. Both stock pens are closed.

SLAUGHTER AT KOKOMO.

Kokomo, Ind.—Two hundred and twenty-three cattle, sheep and hogs, suffering from the foot and mouth disease were killed near here by Federal officers. Three hundred sheep, which have developed symptoms of the disease, will be killed this week.
