RED CROSS SEALS

To Cities of Kentucky—Plan to Sell Over One Million This Christmas Season—10,000 to Maysville.
 Frankfort—Over 1,000,000 Red Cross stamps will be distributed for sale in Kentucky during the holiday season, under the supervision of Roy French, secretary of the State Tuberculosis Commission. Two hundred thousand will be sent at once to Louisville, 500,000 to Covington, 100,000 to Lexington and Paducah, 15,000 to Georgetown, 10,000 to Ashland and Maysville, 4,000 to Somerset, 3,000 to Harrodsburg and Franklin, 2,000 to Fulton and Warsaw, and 1,500 to Franklin.

NINETEEN TRUTHFUL NEGROES REWARDED.

COURT OF APPEALS SAYS COMPANY MUST PAY ACCIDENT INSURANCE.

Mrs. Edith W. Ford, widow of Gale Ford, who was drowned at Louisville August 28 or 29, 1912, won her suit in the Court of Appeals for \$5,000, the amount of accident insurance carried by her husband in the Interstate Business Men's Accident Association.

Ford, who formerly was connected with the State Auditor's office, was cashier of a bank at Dixon, Tenn. He owned the bank \$6,000 and had allowed a man to overdraft \$3,000. He needed money which friends at Dixon offered to lend him, but he decided to go to Louisville and borrow it. He went there for that purpose and secured a room August 28 at the Old Inn. Then he went to the home of a friend, whose wife told him her husband was returning that day on a Kentucky river boat. He said he would go down to meet it. The boat was late. Ford disappeared and on August 31 his body was found in the river.

The insurance company resisted payment of the policy alleging that the facts did not indicate whether Ford died by accident, or committed suicide. The Franklin Circuit Court gave the widow judgment for the full amount of insurance and the Court of Appeals in an opinion by Chief Justice Hobson, said the facts justified the verdict.
