SINGULAR ACCIDENT

Man's Skull Crushed By Runaway Horse's Teeth, Animal Plunging On Loaded Wagon, Breaking Its Neck.

Last night about 8 o'clock, Erva Crane, aged 28, married, and living at Sherburne, Fleming county, while driving a loaded wagon on the pike near Wedonia, was struck by the teeth of a runaway horse attached to a cart.

ANOTHER PARALYSER FOR THE WEST VIRGINIA DRYE

Union, W. Va., December 8.—Judge Herndon of the Circuit Court has ruled that it was not unlawful for a resident of this state to act as the agent of a purchaser in this state, buy liquor at a licensed saloon in another state and deliver it to a purchaser in West Virginia. DISSATISFACTION

Marked Opening of Maysville Tobacco Market

Prices On Higher Grades Way Off—Otherwise Day Was Big Success

The opening of the Maysville loose leaf tobacco market yesterday was a pronounced success in every way—except the prices.

Again it is plainly in evidence that the buyers—we won't say the tobacco trust—think they have the farmers and tobacco growers at their mercy. Be calm. Wait and see.

However, yesterday's opening was most satisfactory to all except the growers, and the grower is the main factor in this great business.

The crowd was there. The tobacco was there. The ideal weather for tobacco was there.

Everything just right—but about \$3 below normal price.

The low grades sold well, but the leaf and better grades were away below what was expected in price, in many cases \$5 to \$7 dollars per hundred.

But, have patience. Do not judge things too quickly. Give the market time to adjust itself to the new condition, and perhaps at the week's end things may be quite different.

The farmers can not grow and market tobacco under an average price of \$10 per hundred, in winter order.

Why should the raw tobacco slump in price and the manufactured article remain the same, or higher?

But, again. Wait and see! Yesterday's sales started at 9 o'clock a. m., at the Farmers house with Auctioneer McClure right on the job.

First crop sold was 1,665 pounds at \$9.21 to American Tobacco Company, M. M. Gary, agent at Maysville. Tobacco was grown by T. B. Roberson.

Following were the sales by houses:

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There were 100,000 pounds on the floors of the Home and a block sale resulted. About 20,000 pounds were disposed of at prices averaging over \$10. Sale continued this morning.

Over 50,000 pounds were on the floors of the Independent house, but darkness prevented any sales. Opening sale this morning.

It was indeed inspiring to view Maysville's immense tobacco market.

DEATH OF FORMER MAYSVILLIAN CIRCUIT COURT PETIT JURORS APPOINTED.

Mr. Andrew Jackson Ryder, a brother of Mr. Frank Ryder and Mrs. William Wood of this city, passed away at his home in Mendota, Ill., on November 18 last, after a illness of only four days. Deceased was born in this city on May 9, 1828, being the son of John and Nancy Ryder. On September 15, 1853, he was married to Miss Amanda Woodworth Tankford, and to this union were born eight children.

Mr. Ryder moved from this city to Toulon, Ill., in 1856, and he resided in that city until the fall of last year, when he moved to Mendota to make his home with his daughter, Mrs. E. T. Grim of that place.

He was a devoted member of the Christian church, being an honorary deacon of the Toulon church at the time of his death.

Those who survive are a loving wife, who journeyed by his side for more than sixty-one years, two sons, John E. of Toulon, and Frank of Sterling, Ill.; two daughters, Mrs. Luella Grim of Mendota, Ill., and Mrs. Virginia Miller of Sioux City, Ia.; twenty grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon, December 1, from the Christian church in Toulon, being in charge of Rev. Charles Williams of Kenawen, a former pastor. Interment was in Toulon cemetery.
