

PROHIBITION COMES BEFORE THE CONGRESS.

Indications are that the committee will bring in a special rule to force a vote on the prohibition issue which House members dodged last session. TO URGE RAISE

In Postal Rates—Burlison Wants Increase On Second Class Matter—Blow To Newspapers.

(American Press.)
Postmaster General Burlison is going to renew his recommendations in regard to second class mail in his forthcoming annual report. He will take up the finding of the Hughes commission and urge Congress to carry out his recommendations which were for an increase upon all second class mail, including newspapers as well as periodicals. This will mean doubling the present rate. The report of the postmaster general, however, will point out that even doubling the rate will not meet the expense of transporting the second class mail. This has been the cry of all those who have insisted that the second class rates should be increased.

In connection with an increase of the rates on newspapers and periodicals the postmaster general, it is believed, will recommend the repeal of the present law which prohibits the extension of the "blue tag" system. At present the "blue tag" system applies to only two zones. If it is extended all over the United States it will seriously affect the periodicals, because of the extra time it will take to ship publications by freight instead of by mail. The repeal of this provision is now contained in the Moon railway mail postal bill, but that bill may have some difficulty in passing the Senate.

SALOONS IN NEW YORK STATE.

Prohibition as a political issue has never attained much of a foothold in New York State, but significant things are happening in that state in regard to the liquor traffic.

In 1896 New York State, with a population of 6,000,000, had 32,257 licensed saloons within its boundaries. In 1914, with a population of at least 10,000,000, the state has only 23,473 licensed saloons. While the population has increased 4,000,000, the number of saloons has fallen 9,784, or putting it another way, while there was one saloon to each 190 of population eighteen years ago, there is now only one saloon to every 429 of population.

These things have come about during an era when a considerable part of the population of New York State has looked on with amused indifference at the agitation in progress in other states, but they show conclusively the effect in New York of a mighty educational movement against the excessive use of alcoholic stimulants that has, during the last ten years, shaken two continents.

The figures given above, it may be stated, are furnished by the New York Brewers' Association, and verified by the New York World.—Louisville Post.

GOOD ADVICE AS TO CHILDREN.

Children should not be allowed to "mess" over their food until it is only fit for the garbage pail; they should be given only what they will eat; more than that is simple waste. If they find they have more on their plate than their appetite calls for, teach them to leave it in a condition where it may be put on a smaller dish and set away for use at another meal, even though in a different form. In the matter of clothing, bed clothing, cooking utensils and with odds and ends of furniture, it is the same wasteful way of casting aside. Many a dollar can be saved by looking after the dime.
