Duncan Stone, an express messenger, was killed at his home in Bowling Green by the accidental discharge of a revolver which his wife was handing to him.

Senator Camden has been offered and has refused the presidency of the new state organization to be formed by the tobacco growers of Kentucky.

FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE

Must Be Checked In Kentucky Says J. W. Newman, Commissioner of Agriculture, Who Sends An Appealing Letter To County Judge W. H. Rice.

County Judge W. H. Rice yesterday received from J. W. Newman, Commissioner of Agriculture, and now Ex-officio chairman of the State Live Stock Sanitary Board, the following letter, which is an appeal to the farmers of Mason county to help in the eradication of the foot and mouth disease from Kentucky:

Louisville, Ky., February 20, 1915.
Dear Judge: Copy of Quarantine Order No. 28, of the State Live Stock Sanitary Board, has been mailed you. In calling your attention to this order, permit me to say that this was issued for the purpose of giving the county authorities the backing of the law, in order that they might protect the live stock in their respective counties. It is your duty, as chairman of the Fiscal Court, to prevent the spread of contagious diseases among the live stock in your county, so far as it is possible so to do. As Ex-officio Chairman of the State Live Stock Sanitary Board, it has fallen to my lot to endeavor to protect this industry in the entire state. It has been to me, and will be to you, a very unpleasant duty. However, as officials, we are bound by our oaths, and whatever may be the sacrifices that we must make, there is nothing left for us to do in this emergency but to do our duty.

If you exercise the powers vested in you by law, and under this official order, you can prevent the introduction of the dreaded plague of foot and mouth disease into your county, and if you have the co-operation of your live stock owners, and an outbreak should occur, you can soon check it. Permit me to suggest to you that you call a meeting of the live stock owners of your county, warn them of the dangers now threatening the state, and appeal to them to organize a vigilance committee to aid you in preserving to your people one of the great, if not the greatest, industries of your county.

This disease now rages in three counties of Kentucky. We know others are endangered, and are compelled to remain here at the seat of infection, and hence must look to the farmers of each county to, in a great measure, save themselves. Remember that the ship that carries a \$40,000,000 industry in this state is now in great peril, and while we hope to be able to save it from utter destruction, we feel that we can only do so by sending out a warning to each county for its people to organize, not for lawlessness, but to enforce the law, educate the people to the dangers confronting them, and break down this awful wall of ignorance, prejudice and inactivity on the part of many live stock owners.

The state and Federal authorities have now, and have always had but one object in view, and that is to help the live stock owners. They have suffered ridicule, censure and misrepresentation from the day this disease broke out in Kentucky. They have not had the confidence of the live stock owners, and have endured many unkind things by some of the people, and some of the press. They have been right all the time, and have been backed by the experience of the civilized nations of Europe, for one hundred years, and by the experience of the Federal government in five previous outbreaks of this disease; and they have bent every energy to save the farmers from these great losses and inconveniences.

Every government in Europe has expended large sums of money in combating this awful plague, it costing Germany in one fight \$37,000,000, and England at one time \$7,000,000. The United States government has now expended some \$3,500,000 in this fight, and yet the average live stock owner will believe in politicians, road-side philosophers or inexperienced theorists rather than believe the accuracy of history.

It would be much more pleasant for state and Federal officials to refrain from taking action, and let the people suffer the consequences, but no official with a conscience can sit idly by and

JURISDICTION

Of County Judges Upheld By Ruling of Appellate Court.

Frankfort.—The act of 1914, providing that county judges shall have jurisdiction in all misdemeanor cases except in counties having courts of continuous session, was declared unconstitutional in the case of Green Kilburn, county judge of Lee county, against S. K. Chapman.

Chapman was arrested on a warrant charging him with suffering gaming, and was tried by the county judge. He objected to the jurisdiction of the judge on the grounds that the act under which he was tried violated section 141 of the constitution, which provides that the jurisdiction of county judges shall be uniform throughout the commonwealth.
