Maysville Man Struck By Dredging Shovel At Government Dam.

Boone Beckett, one of the night men employed at the government dam, was struck by the shovel of one of the dredges early Wednesday morning while at work on the cofferdam and badly injured.

He was standing on a barge directing the swinging of the crane that handles the shovel and in some manner allowed the shovel to come too close to him and before he could get out of the way the heavy implement struck him in the side, breaking three ribs and tearing two loose from his backbone.

He was removed to the company hospital and medical aid promptly given him, and is now resting fairly well.

CENTRAL DEPOT RUMORED.
