### CHANGE IN TEACHERS

#### LEWISBURG TO HAVE SEVERAL NEW MEMBERS ON THE FACULTY.

Friday at the county institute at Mayslick, it became known that a change in the teaching corps of the county will go into effect today. The Lewisburg school will be the one most affected, as the two popular teachers of that large school will take up more lucrative positions. Miss Allilee King, who for the past eleven years has endeared herself to the school boys and girls of the Lewisburg district, will accept a position under the County Superintendent as supervisor of one room schools in the county. Miss Fanny Tuggle, the other popular "school marm" of the Lewisburg schools, will accept a position with the federal government as teacher in home economics throughout the county. The passing from the midst of the Lewisburg residents of these two well-liked women will be greatly missed, as they have sent more scholars through the schools of the county than any other two teachers in the county. Twenty-one of their pupils have completed the course of study offered by the county schools and of these twelve never attended a class conducted by any other teachers but these two.

In their successors, Miss Ella Wallace and Miss Laura Crosby, the County Board of Education and the citizens of Lewisburg could not have found a better two to fit in the place of Misses King and Tuggle. Miss Crosby is a teacher of much experience and has met with success wherever she has taught, and Miss Wallace is recognized as one of the leading educators of the state, having had some of the most prominent personages of the country as her scholars. They will take charge of their new schools this morning and from their past records we are assured that their new undertaking will be a success from the beginning.
