

HANDSOME PUBLICATION

"Maroon and White," School Paper, Edited by Former Maysville Boy, Thing of Beauty.

The editor of The Ledger is deeply indebted to Messrs. Anderson, Louis and George O'Hare, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Martin O'Hare, formerly of Maysville, now located at Austin, Ill., a suburb of Chicago, for a copy of one of the most handsome high school papers we have seen in many a day.

The publication is a volume of more than 150 pages 7 by 10 1/2 inches, with outside cover of purple and gold printed on good quality of white enamel paper. The whole is profusely illustrated, and is a real work of art, beautifully arranged, reflecting much credit upon the taste and skill of the editors and managers.

The first part of the book shows pictures of the graduating class, with a brief sketch of each member. An idea of the get-up of the sketches, we here reproduce one of them:

"Lucille Cumfer. 'Lutes' was another one of those girls who put zeal and zest in our high school life. As Personal Editor of the Maroon and White, she was without equal. She was also a leader in the Glee Club, Civics Club and Dramatic Club. As a member of the Senior Council her advice was priceless. Member of the 'Push.'"

The work of editing the volume was under the able direction of Mr. Anderson O'Hare, a Maysville boy, and shows he has rare talent for journalism. His likeness appears in a full-page half-tone opposite his editorial, in which he gives praise to the staff who aided him. We quote part of the editorial:

"THE CURTAIN DESCENDS. 'After much talk and long waiting, we here present to you for your approval, the masterpiece of the staff of nineteen-fifteen and a half.

"It is our earnest hope that this volume will meet with your heartiest approval, because it represents weeks of hard and patient labor. Within its covers are our greatest efforts.

The Maroon and White is the paper of the school and its students. It is published for your benefit, and we hope that you have enjoyed the issues during the last semester.

"Financially, it has reached the zenith of its career, having more than doubled the largest amount on hand in its treasury at any previous time. In literary value we hope it has reached, if not exceeded, the standard set by its former editors.

"Criticism? Yes, plenty of it! But after all we have not felt much hurt, for it was largely of a class that is indirect compliment. Those who have criticised us have enabled us to make the Maroon and White reach the standard it now has.

"ANDERSON O'HARE." Anderson and Louis O'Hare are among this year's graduates of the Austin (Ill.) High School, and covered themselves with honor in the class rooms.

We congratulate you, boys, and know you will 'make good' wherever you may go.
