**MAYSVILLE LOST**  
Sunday's Game to Huntington by the Score of 6 to 2—McGraynor Driven From Diamond, Was Replaced by Few.  
In a game featured by bad playing on both sides the Huntington "Boosters" walked away with the game with the locals at League Park Sunday afternoon, the score being 6 to 2.  
"Muck" McGraynor, the pride of Maysville fandom, started the game for the Burley Cubs but his offerings were hammered all over the lot and he retired at the end of the sixth inning in favor of Few, the 18-year-old pitcher from New Richmond, Ohio, who pitched good ball for the rest of the game.  
"Hank" DeLotel was the slabman for the visitors and at no time was he in danger. He allowed six scattered hits.  
Huntington started the ball to rolling in the first frame. Schmeir lined the first ball pitched into Tinin's hands. Ollum tripped over Jones' head and scored on Shelton's out at first. Midkiff fouled to Albright.  
Maysville tied the score in the second inning. Mueller beat out a bouncer to third. Nixon hit to DeLotel, who threw Mueller out at second. Schlenker singled through short, Nixon on going to third. Schlenker stole second. Nixon scored and Schlenker went to third on Albright's fly to right. Devore rolled to Ollum and was thrown out at first.  
Huntington again took the lead in the third. DeLotel singled through the box. Schmeir fanned. Ollum popped to Schlenker. Shelton singled to left. Devore muffed the ball allowing DeLotel to score and Shelton to perch on the second sack. Midkiff flied to Tinin.  
The good work was continued by the visitors in the fourth. Distel walked. Gibson sacrificed. Frey singled to right scoring Dietsel. McDaniel flied to Jones, who made a great running catch of the ball. DeLotel flied to Tinin.  
Huntington laid quiet in the fifth but came back stronger than ever in the sixth. Midkiff singled to center, stole second, went to third on Mueller's throw over second and home when Albright let the ball get through him at third. Gibson bounded to Kelly and was thrown out at first. Brown singled to short. McDaniel singled to right. Tinin handled the ball badly and Brown scored and McDaniel went to third. DeLotel fanned.  
With two down in the ninth Ollum tripped. Shelton hit to Kelly, who threw over Nixon's head, Ollum scoring and Shelton to second. Midkiff singled to left and Shelton was thrown out at the plate.  
The last run was made by Maysville in the ninth when with one down Mueller tripped and scored on Nixon's fly to Shelton. Schlenker bounded to Brown and was thrown out at first.

He is decidedly off on balls and strikes, never calling a strike that cuts the corner of the plate. On the bases it seems that he favors the fielders rather than the runner on any close play.

**ENGINEER ALDRICH**  
In Head-On Collision Near Paris—Air-Brakes Fall to Work and Two Engines Are Damaged  
Paris, Ky., May 12.—An outboard passenger train on the Louisville and Nashville road in charge of Conductor Ben Parker and Engineer Ed Aldrich crashed into a northbound passenger train at Kinney station, two miles from Paris, this morning.  
The northbound train which was in charge of Conductor T. J. Keith and Engineer T. H. Roberts, was preparing to take a siding to allow the southbound to pass. The air-brakes on the latter refused to work, and altho the train crew tried to stop the train by the use of hand-brakes, the two trains crashed together head-on. Both engines were badly damaged. The trains crews and passengers were badly shaken up and frightened, but no serious injury was suffered by anyone.

The Huntington team has three old Maysville players on its roster—John McDaniel, catcher; Kemper Shelton, outfielder; and Oscar DeLotel, pitcher. However, it has been some time since any of them wore a Maysville uniform.
