TRAPSHOOTERS BREAK RECORDS

Dr. Woolfolk Barrow, of Lexington, Wins State Championship—H. H. Hise Takes Challenge Cup Contest With 99 "Hits."
Trapshooting records for Kentucky were sent glimmering yesterday in both the Challenge Cup and State Championship races at the Fayette Gun Club, when Dr. Woolfolk Barrow, of Lexington, by scoring 99 won the State Championship from W. H. Hall, of Maysville. Ben Hise missed but one of the hundred birds and won a leg on the Challenge Cup. Never before in the history of either event has a score of 99 been needed to win.
Ben Hise was way out in front in the Challenge Cup event but needed 99 to beat H. S. Bonser, who finished with a 98. Dr. Barrow was never considered a contender for the championship, until he started "bustin' 'em right and left" in the event won by Hise. The doctor scored 92 in this race.
The big race was a spirited contest from the start. Dr. Barrow, W. H. Hall, W. B. Allen, J. D. Gay, Ben Goff, J. N. Shropshire and C. B. Strother standing out from the rest after the half century mark had been passed in the "pull" call.
Dr. Barrow missed one bird in the fourth round, but after that he held a steady aim and a hawk eye, and that's the story. The victor was presented with the State Championship Cup.
W. H. Hall and W. B. Allen, with a score of 97; J. D. Gay and Ben Goff, with 96; and J. N. Shropshire and C. B. Strother, with 95, finished next to Dr. Barrow and all won prizes.
Woolfolk Henderson, of Lexington, was high gun for the two days of the tournament. Mr. Henderson missed six birds out of 400, beating all professionals as well as amateurs. The score sets a new mark for high gun in a Kentucky state event.

Elected Principal of High School at Meeting of Board of Education Wednesday Night—Other Business Transacted.
At a called meeting of the Board of Education held at the High School Building Wednesday night the resignation of Prof. C. S. Dale as principal was received and accepted. It was with regret that the Board gave up Mr. Dale as he has been one of the most capable men ever in the High School department.
Acting upon the suggestion of Prof. Mance and Superintendent W. J. Caplinger the Board voted unanimously for the election of Prof. C. S. Dale as the new principal. Mr. Dale has been a teacher in the High School for the past three years and is thoroughly familiar and prepared for the position.
Prof. Robert N. Hoeflich tendered his resignation as teacher of mathematics in the High School and same was accepted.
Miss Elsie B. Heller of Paris, a graduate of Kentucky State University was elected to a position in the High School department by the unanimous vote of the Board.
There are still several positions to be filled and they will be acted upon at the regular meeting of the Board on Wednesday night, June 13.
Dr. John Irvine and Mr. and Mrs. S. J. Hull and two children left Wednesday afternoon for Cincinnati where slight operations for throat trouble will be performed on the children.
