## SUIT FILED

By Lee Morgan Against Louisville and Nashville Railroad for Selling Him a Ticket to Wrong Place.

In the Mason Circuit Court yesterday Lee Morgan of this city filed suit for \$500 against the Louisville and Nashville Railroad for selling him a ticket to the wrong place.

The plaintiff alleges that in April, 1916, having business of grave importance at Glendean, Ky., in the discharge of which business he engaged the services of J. A. Reed; he, the plaintiff, ordered the defendant, its agents and employees, at its ticket office in this city, to sell him two roundtrip tickets, one for himself and one for the said Reed. He says that instead of delivering to him the tickets to the point ordered, to-wit Glendean and return, the defendant, its agents and employees, with gross neglect, carelessness and indifference, delivered to him round trip ticket to Glendale, Ky., another point on the line of the defendant, but on a division from that on which Glendean is located and far distant from it. The plaintiff being unable to write or read was unable to learn, and did not learn that the tickets so delivered were for Glendale, Ky., instead of Glendean until after he and the said Reed were late at night and without sufficient

funds, discharged from the train at Glendale, Ky.

He says that by reason of the said gross neglect, carelessness and indifference of the defendant, put the plaintiff to great inconvenience, humiliation and mortification trouble and loss of time, he was obliged to spend money necessary for other independent and to purchase a ticket for the City of Louisville to Glendean and return and was obliged to continue his important mission without the said Reed. He says that by reason of his being unable to return to his employers in the Maysville Cotton Mills as he had promised his employers to do, and he would have done so had not been for the said neglect carelessness and indifference of the defendant, he was discharged from his position, all of which was done to his great damage in the sum of \$500. He asks for \$500 and all proper relief.

Mr. F. P. O'Donnell is the attorney for the plaintiff.

## OPENING SESSION

Of the Farmers Chautauqua Will Be Held in the Germantown Fair Grounds Today—Interesting Program.

The first days session of the second annual Farmers Chautauqua will be held in the Germantown Fair Grounds today.

This afternoon's program will be opened by a lecture, "Principles of Breeding" by Mr. T. R. Bryant. The Lyceum Concert Co. of Cincinnati will give a splendid musical selection, followed by another address, "Sanitation in Dairying" by Mr. W. D. Nicholls. Mr. T. R. Bryant will also give another address, "Principles of Feeding."

Tomorrow's program will be opened in the morning by a union service conducted by Rev. E. B. Barnes of Richmond, Ky. Rev. Barnes is one of the most noted ministers in the State of Kentucky. In the afternoon an address by Judge Barker of the State University at Lexington, will be the offering.

This is the second Tri-County Farmers Chautauqua and is given by the State Extension Department to the farmers of Mason, Bracken and Robertson counties. Germantown is the most convenient place to hold the chautauqua, as the sessions will be in the Fair Grounds at that place.

It is up to every farmer in the three counties to take advantage of the opportunity and become a modern, scientific farmer. The Farmers Chautauqua movement is here to stay. They have been held in various parts of the state for the past three years and not one failure has been experienced. Every farmer who has the welfare of his community at heart, the betterment of his environments, is urged to come and make the Chautauqua a permanent institution.

The best way to educate the farmer is to have him exchange ideas with his fellow farmer and discuss the problems with the Farm Educators of Kentucky. The chautauqua will furnish means.
