## CORONER'S INQUEST

Into Death of Albert Starks, Who Was Fatally Wounded at South Ripley Monday Night, Held Yesterday Afternoon.

The inquest into the death of Albert Starks, who was shot and fatally wounded at South Ripley, Monday evening, was held by Coroner Charles Slack yesterday afternoon in Police Court.

Ike McAllister stated that he had been in South Ripley at the time of the shooting but had not investigated as he did not want to be mixed up in any trouble.

Irene Walker, a colored girl, was the chief witness in the case. She stated that she had gone to Ripley Monday morning and that during the day she had some trouble with Pete Faulkner. He had taken her coat and

when she was preparing to take an early train for home he threw it in the river, necessitating that she go back and have it dried at the home of a friend. Later in the evening she with several other girls and men left for the Kentucky side of the river, Starks was in the crowd and he was carrying her umbrella. When they arrived in South Ripley Faulkner came up to Starks and told him that the woman was his girl. Starks replied that he did not mean any harm, starting an argument. The debate waxed warm and Faulkner struck the other man. They grappled and Starks hit Faulkner with a whiskey bottle. Faulkner then drew a revolver and shot three times.

Frank Hunter, a colored man, was the only other witness of the affair. He said that he had been in the company of Faulkner and that he had seen his companion strike Starks three times. He said that he had not seen Starks strike his opponent with a whiskey bottle.

Dr. Harover and Chief Mackey also testified as to the nature of the man's wounds and to his deathbed statement. The man was shot through the stomach and his legs were also pierced. In his statement he said that he had been shot by Pete Faulkner.

The following verdict was returned by the jury:

“We, the jury appointed to investigate the killing of Albert Starks, find that he came to his death by a pistol wound fired from pistol in the hands of Pete Faulkner at South Ripley, Mason county, October 9, 1916.

## CONVENIENCES

Edgemont is Provided With Every Improvement That Can Be Found in Any Section of Maysville.

The Maysville Gas Co. installed the gas line and delivers gas to the Edgemont main at the same rate now charged, or which may hereafter be charged Maysville consumers, rendering the account to each consumer in the same manner and on the same terms as are given down town users.

Water is taken for the whole of Edgemont from the mains which leave the city reservoir, under the meter system, be given to the consumers of similar quantities of water. It is dumped through the Edgemont system by an automatic, electrically driven pump and supplied to the Edgemont consumers. Any profit, if made, will be used by the trustees in the improvement of the grounds.
