Of the High School District Met Friday and Organized for the Coming Year—May Consolidate Associations.

A meeting of the parents and teachers of the High School District held in the High School building on last Friday resulted in perfecting an organization for the coming year. A good association was had in that district three years ago but it has not been reorganized until the day mentioned.

Addresses by Mrs. James Ross and Prof. W. J. Caplinger opened the meeting on Friday. They spoke of the needs of such an organization and asked that one be organized at the meeting. This was done and Mrs. James Ross was elected as temporary chairman and Mrs. N. S. Calhoun as temporary secretary. A nominating committee was then appointed to report back at the next meeting which is to be held on Friday of this week. Seventeen persons allied themselves for the Association.

Some talk was then heard of consolidating all of the Parent-Teacher Associations into one body for the purpose of studying High School problems alone. Each body would be able to meet at its own building as often as possible to study conditions of that particular building and once a month meet in the central building and consider the problems of the High School. This would be a good move on the part of the various organizations in the city and would be a great help to that department of the schools. It is hoped that this can be carried out.

The Parent-Teacher Associations have been in this city for some time and they have done a good work. The Forest Avenue body has secured a piano for that building and are now planning to place a library in the building. The First District Association has established the penny lunch in that building is a great help to many children. They also distribute a great deal of clothing to unfortunate children of that district. The organizations have been a great help to all of the schools and it is hoped that they will continue in their good work.

### FAIR DATES

The dates for the Maysville Tobacco Fair and Corn Show have been set as November 23, 24 and 25 instead of November 30, December 1 and 2. The dates were changed on account of Thanksgiving coming on November 30 on which day it would be impossible to open the fair. The sub-committee on arrangements will meet tonight in the Chamber of Commerce to talk over plans for the fair.

### DID NOT PLAY

The game will be played next Sunday if the weather permits and will be doubly interesting on account of the enforced delay as the teams are very anxious to test their strength against each other.

## SPECIAL REGISTRATION

Begins Next Monday—Both Parties Making Effort to Increase Voting List Before November 7.

With the special registration but one week off, efforts are being made by both the Democrats and Republicans to get out as big a registration for the three days, starting next Monday, October 30, as is possible. Both the dominating parties, while apparently satisfied with the result of the general registration earlier in the month, realize that the more who registered means the more who vote.

The special registration next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, will be held in the county clerk's office at the courthouse. Three classes of voters are eligible to register at the special registration. They are those who were necessarily absent from the city on the general registration day; those who were unable to register because they were ill, or those who were unable to register because of illness of some member of their family. Other than these three causes none will be accepted by the county clerk. Young men who were 21 years old after the general registration day, but before election day, should have registered earlier in the month, and unless kept away from the polls because of one of the above reasons, will not be allowed to register or vote.

The man who wishes to register next week, must make affidavit to the county clerk, before he is allowed to register, that he was kept away from the polls on the general registration day, because of absence from the city, illness to himself or illness of some member of his family. One challenger from each party will be present and can challenge the affidavit of any man should this be done, and the voter still insists that he should be allowed to register under the special registration law, the challenger is then forced to get the affidavits of not less than two people, that the statement of the man wishing to register is untrue.

The county clerk then has the right to decide whether the man should or should not register. However, either party has the right, after the decision of the county clerk, to appeal to the court for a final decision in the matter.
