AMERICAN STEAMER IS SUBMERGED; 21 OF CREW ARE SAFE

New York, November 27—Fifty-eight men, including 26 American citizens and five naturalized Americans, comprising the crew of the American steamship Actaon, reported sunk off the European coast. A dispatch from London today said twenty-one survivors had reached port Camarinas, Spain, and that the other members of the crew were missing.

The London cablegram made no mention of United States naval gunners aboard nor do the names of any appear in the records of the United States shipping commissioner here. It is assumed there were some on board inasmuch as the vessel was controlled by the United States Shipping Board.

Formerly the German steamship Adadsturm, of 5,000 tons gross, the Actaon left New York early in October, carrying government supplies for Burdeaux. It is believed she was on the return voyage when sunk. She was commanded by W. J. Johnson. The vessel was built in Germany in 1909 and was seized by this government after the war with Germany began.

The Actaon is the first of the seized German steamships to be sunk while in American trade.

ATTORNEY FAILS TO SHAKE STORY TOLD BY WOMAN

Mincola, N. Y., November 27—Four hours of searching cross examination by District Attorney Charles B. Weeks today failed to move Mrs. Blanca de Saullles from the story she told from the witness stand yesterday in her trial on a charge of murdering her former husband, John de Saullles.

The twenty three old Chilean heiress reiterated her version of the tragedy of the night of August 3 where at de Saullles' Long Island home in the same dispassionate manner in which she testified yesterday. Her answers were deliberate and were frequently made after pauses in which she seemed to be given them consideration or striving to freshen her recollections. Her attitude of complete self-possession notwithstanding the unusual nature of the examination she was undergoing, was a subject of comment among the spectators who crowded the trial chamber.

FIVE ATTACKS OF GERMANS BEATEN OFF BY ITALIANS

Italian Army Headquarters in Northern Italy, Monday, November 27—Five determined attacks by Austro-German forces on the left wing of the Italian fourth army, near Monte Perlica, between the Brenta and the Piave, were delivered today. The enemy rushes were broken by the defensive troops with heavy losses to the attackers.

Not only the left but the right wing and the center of the army holding this sector was subjected to attack, the enemy effort now attaining its full force here. On the right and the center, the struggle raged from Monte Monfenera westward with the Italians holding their lines at all points.

The fluctuations of the great battle have now developed to a stage where the resisting power of the Italian army has been demonstrated to be sufficient to retard, if not prevent any sudden rush through the passes leading to the Venetian plains.

PROGRESSING NICELY

EASTERN KENTUCKY BOOTLEGGERS ARE CHARGING \$4 A QUART FOR WHISKEY, DE-CLARES U. S. AGENT

Winchester, Ky., November 26 — That moonshining will increase, even in the face of the watchfulness of the government officers, following the ban placed on the manufacture of liquor in the distilleries of the country, is the opinion of Deputy United States Marshall George Sizemore, of Hazard, who passed through Winchester Monday morning en route to London to attend Federal court there. The price of moonshine liquor has advanced to such an extent that production is certain to have a very alluring effect, and it is his belief that in a few months, in spite of the efforts of the revenue men, the mountains will be bristling with stills.

Sizemore says that in making the most recent arrests of men charged with moonshining he has found that they charged as high as \$4 a quart for the product of the illicit stills.

RED CROSS LAUNCHES MEMBERSHIP CAMPAIGN

Cleveland, Ohio, November 26 — "Not a campaign for money, but a campaign for men and women," was the keynote of a Red Cross Christmas membership drive held this afternoon. More than 100 representatives of chapters in Northern Ohio and Indiana attended and enthusiastically pledged themselves to enroll a minimum of 21 per cent of their population as Red Cross members by Christmas Eve.

Full campaign plans were discussed by William G. Rose, campaign director in the Lake division, which includes 347 Red Cross chapters in Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky. Ohio was given a quota of 800,000. Tomorrow at Indianapolis Mr. Rose will meet with chapter representatives from Central and Southern Indiana and will assign the Indiana quota, which is 450,000. Meetings will be held next week in Kentucky, which has a quota of 350,000.

ALCOHOLIC CONTENTS OF BEER WILL BE CUT TO 3 PERCENT BY FOOD BOARD

Washington, November 26—Orders reducing the alcoholic contents of beer to three per cent. will be issued soon by the Food Administration, with the approval of President Wilson. At the same time the amount of grain used by brewers will be cut down approximately 20 per cent., although the volume of beer will not be decreased.

In making this announcement, the food administration points out that since there is in the country a two or three years supply of whiskey, it is undesirable at the present time to stop entirely the brewing of beer, because of the possibility of driving the people to whiskey drinking. The social question involved, it is declared, must be given equal consideration with that of food conservation.

GOVERNMENT REQUISITIONS C. & O PASSENGER EQUIPMENT FOR TROOP MOVEMENT

Huntington, W. Va., November 28—Local Chesapeake & Ohio passenger trains will be short of coaches during the present week due to a requisition of equipment by the government for a movement of troops "somewhere in America."

As a result the local management has issued an appeal to the public to travel no more than is absolutely necessary during the present week.

DON'T FORGET 'EM

War Tax Stamps Must Be On Parcel Post Packages Next Month—May Be Purchased at Postoffice and Stations.

Beginning December 1 no domestic parcel post parcels on which the postage charge amount to 25 cents or more will be transmitted in the mails unless the proper amount of war tax revenue stamps is affixed to the parcel.

Parcels on which the postal charges less than 25 cents will not require any war stamp.

Parcels on which the postage charges amount to 25 cents require a one-cent war stamp affixed to the parcel in addition to the postage.

Parcels on which the postage charges are from 26 cents to 50 cents inclusive require a two-cent war stamp affixed in addition to the postage.

Parcels on which the postage charges are from 51 cents to 75 cents inclusive require a three-cent war stamp affixed, and so on upward each 25 cents or fraction of 25 cents additional charges for postage requiring an additional one-cent war stamp to be affixed.

War-tax stamps may be purchased at the postoffice and stations.

COLD WEATHER IN THE EAST REPORTED

Washington, November 27—Very cold weather, with temperatures from 10 to 43 degrees below seasonal average was reported from the Lower Lake region, the Middle Atlantic States and New England today, with the lowest temperature at Canton, N. Y., where 16 degrees below zero was recorded.

It was colder in the plateau region and the Northwest also, but in the southwestern part of the country the weather was from 10 to 40 degrees warmer than the seasonal average. Warmer weather for the Northeastern part of the country was forecast for tonight, with snow or rain in New England and the Middle Atlantic States.
