AMERICA TO JOIN JAPS

Siberian Invasion Favored—Joint Action Wholly Acceptable to All Entente Allies Is Expected—Negotiations Are On.

Washington, February 28—Japan's move to develop the feeling of the allies toward a proposal for joint military operations in Siberia to keep the vast stores at Vladivostok and also the Trans-Siberian railway from falling into the hands of the German invaders of Russia, was widely discussed today among diplomats and officials, but all were reluctant to give opinions for publication.

Opinion in London that the declaration by the Japanese Foreign Minister, Mount Motono, in the Japanese Diet, could only be interpreted as a declaration that Japan was about to intervene, was regarded as further evidence of the negotiations now proceeding between the co-belligerents to make the action of an international character, probably including the participation of American forces.

While all officials here are silent and disposed to minimize discussion of the subject, it is known that exchanges of opinion are going on with the object of a perfect understanding between Japan, the United States and the other co-belligerents, which would make the plan of joint action wholly acceptable to all and thoroughly define its extent and duration.

Russian representatives here oppose action by the Japanese in Siberia, but the co-belligerents are thoroughly alarmed lest the vast quantities of supplies piled up at Vladivostok, bought and paid for with American cash, should fall into the hands of the Germans.

NEW ERA OF ADVANCE

Will Mark Meeting at Huntington, W. Va., Today in Interest of River Improvements and Revival of River Trade.

Huntington, W. Va., March 1—Everything is in readiness for the big meeting to be held here today in the interest of Ohio river improvements.

The first session will be called promptly in the assembly room of the Frederick hotel at 2 this afternoon. C. P. Snow, acting president of the Chamber of Commerce, will preside at the meeting, and Mayor Sehon will welcome the visitors and introduce Governor John J. Cornwell, who is to make the first address on "The Necessity of Immediately Reviving River Transportation."

Other leading addresses will be made by Col. Lansing H. Beach, United States Engineer in charge of Ohio river improvements, and Col. John L. Vance, dean of the Ohio Valley Improvement association, whose name is linked for all time with the work for betterment of the Ohio, and who is due for a great ovation when he steps upon the platform.

The scene of the convention will shift this evening to the Elks' club, in order to clear the way for a ball at the Frederick. Col. Beach will make an interesting talk at the night session on "Ohio River and European Waterways," illustrating the talk with stereopticon views. Col. Vance will speak on "The Necessity for Improving the Ohio River and Better Transportation Facilities."

There will be several other addresses, not mentioning impromptu talks and statements and advice from each of the delegations. Much talent has been invited—Chairman John Small, of the Rivers and Harbors committee of congress; Secretary of Commerce Redfield, in person or proxy; Director General of Railroads McAdoo; Governor Cox, of Ohio; Vice President Whitaker, of the Chesapeake & Ohio railroad; Mayor John Calvin, of Cincinnati, and others—and it is possible that several of the number will be here or send representatives.

BILL TO PREVENT KILLING OF CALVES

Frankfort, Ky., February 28—In the House today the committee reported unfavorably the bill of Representative R. T. Smith, of Hart county, to prohibit the slaughter of calves under twelve months. The motion was made to advance it, and Representative Smith was frequently interrupted during his speech by members bawling like calves, which causes merriment and slaughter.

Representative Cook spoke for the bill, saying he had a petition containing 400 names, urging the passage of the bill. The bill was passed to its first reading on a roll-call 47 to 38.

EDWARD PENCE DEAD

Mr. Edward Pence, former resident of Maysville, dropped dead at his home in Aberdeen, Ohio, at mid-night last evening from a stroke of paralysis. The deceased was 75 years of age and a member of the Methodist Church of Aberdeen. He is survived by his wife.

Funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Methodist Church, Aberdeen.

STRONG ENEMY ATTACKS

Is Repulsed by Americans; More Gas Used by Huns — Well Placed American Machine Gun Sends Stream of Bullets Into the Enemy.

With the American Army in France, February 28—A strong German attack following a heavy barrage fire against the American trenches in the Chemin-des-Dames sector was repulsed with losses to the attackers. The well placed American machine guns sent streams of bullets into the advancing enemy and as the German barrage fire lifted the American artillery quickly laid down a curtain of fire, the German retirings without a single prisoner.

There were no American casualties. Five French soldiers were wounded during the fighting.

The Americans stayed in their dugouts until the proper time, when they jumped to the guns and fought like veterans.

Yesterday one officer and one private were killed and two were wounded by enemy shell fire. One American soldier was "gassed". The Germans made a gas attack also in this sector firing fifty projectiles of high per cent gas and twenty high explosives shells.

One American soldier is dead and eight are suffering from the effects of poisonous gas, so far as reported, but it is probable that more casualties will develop, as in the Toul sector.

There was an attack Monday but the number of casualties to the American troops in this sector since they became engaged can not be determined. All the killed and wounded in these operations are from the New England states.

Mrs. Sarah Nash, one of Lewis county's oldest and most highly respected citizens, is ill at her home with heart trouble and is not expected to recover.

RAILWAY MEASURE PASSED BY HOUSE BY BIG MAJORITY

Washington, February 28—The bill to govern federal operation of railroads was passed by the house tonight by a vote of 337 to 6.

Two Democrats and four Republicans voted against the measure when the final test came. They were Thomas, Kentucky, and Gordon, Ohio, Democrats; and Chandler, Oklahoma; Denison, Illinois; Haugen, Iowa, and Ramsey, of Iowa, Republicans.

The senate previously had passed the bill which now goes to conference for settlement of differences between the two houses. The house bill provides for the return of the roads to their owners two years after the war ends instead of in 19 months as the senate draft proposes, and the house measure rests final rate-fixing authority in the President while the senate would leave this power in the Interstate Commerce Commission.
