**BE CAREFUL**

In Mixing Paris Green and Lime Advises Mr. Dieterich—Prizes Offered by Mrs. E. P. Lee on Vegetables.

Mr. Dieterich says that the little black fleas that have been eating holes in the leaves of the beans are dying off from the hot weather and the gardeners need not worry about them. He says gardeners must be careful about the use of Paris Green without adding a quantity of lime. A party told him yesterday about burning up 1000 hills of beans by using Paris Green without adding a bit of lime. The peas will soon be gathered and he suggested that tomatoes or cabbage be planted and plant sugar corn as a second crop after the early potatoes have been dug. Be sure and watch the little aphids under the leaves of your cucumber vines says Mr. Dieterich.

Stanley Reed, President of the Chamber of Commerce is surely doing his bit in cultivating his own garden said one of the ward advisors at the meeting Monday night. "The ward advisors report that they have received very few calls for advice or information from the gardeners in their wards which demonstrates the fact that we have a very intelligent lot of war gardeners or that the citizens do not know who the advisor is in their ward. We have published the names of each advisor in our Wednesday morning stories for quite a few weeks and we hope that every citizen will profit by this effort and ask questions of the advisor in your ward, if you are in doubt about any garden problem. The ward advisors have decided that prizes will only be awarded to the gardeners cultivating their own gardens.

Mrs. E. P. Lee, chairman of the War Garden Department of the Women's Council of Defense, says that the prize on vegetables is to be awarded to the gardener that arrives at first telling her of the first harvest of any vegetable.

"There's so many good gardens in the First Ward that its hard for me to tell which one is the best," said Mr. Ben Cole, but I will say that Oliver Greenlee has a mighty fine garden and claims to have the earliest peas in our ward. I think Mrs. Amos McLaughlin will come mighty near getting the first prize on early beans. She has a fine garden and it is well kept.

Mr. S. P. Browning receives honorable mention as the May war gardener of this ward.

Mr. Frank Clark, the Second Ward war garden advisor, says "That special credit is due Mrs. Helmer and her daughter at Third and Wall streets for the fine garden they have planted and the way it is arranged with such beautiful flowers. Mr. George Harbour is going to have one of the most productive war gardens in this ward. Mr. Charles Hancock has a very fine way in which he has laid out would do credit to a landscape gardener.

The Mayor is deserving of credit for the fine example he is setting for his towns people as a war garden, says Rev. W. B. Campbell of the Third Ward. Rev. Campbell believes that Mrs. John Parker gets more produce out of her ground for the size of the lot than any gardener in the city. Mr. Frank Wright receives honorable mention as the May war gardener of this ward.

War Garden Advisor Outton of the Fourth Ward reports that Ben Fleming has a fine garden on the Hunter lot behind the Postoffice. Jake Caproni's garden on Fifth street is showing results of much effort put forth. Stanley Cullen and Mrs. McDonough are more of the progressive Fifth street gardeners. Dr. Long has given much time and his garden bespeaks an intelligent effort. Dudley Bloomhoff's garden is progressing in all shape. Mrs. John Whitaker has almost everything planted that is raised

**NOTED AGNOSTIC**

Died at Paris Monday—Was One of the Best Known Citizens of Bourbon County.

Mr. William T. Ficklin, one of the best-known citizens of Paris, aged ninety-two, died at the Massie Memorial Hospital, in that city Monday afternoon, as the result of injuries received in a fall from a dormer window at his home some weeks ago. While leaning out of the window Mr. Ficklin lost his hold and fell to the ground below, a distance of about thirty feet. He received a dislocated shoulder blade, both arms were broken, and he sustained internal injuries.

Mr. Ficklin was a native of Fleming county, where he was born in September, 1827. He engaged in merchandising after leaving the country schools, and was very successful. Leaving Fleming he was engaged in business in various parts of the country, and finally landed in Paris, where he opened a business in the house where he met his death. He united with his business the profession of auctioneer, and made many sales on the streets of Paris. In his early youth he united with the Paris Christian church and was for many years a deacon in that congregation.

When Charles C. Moore, editor of the Bluegrass Blade, an agnostic paper published in Lexington, severely criticized several members of the congregation, for which he was arrested and placed in the Paris jail, Mr. Ficklin became his champion, by reason of which he was expelled from the membership in that congregation. He afterwards became an infidel and during the remainder of his life worked faithfully to convert others to that belief. He was an ardent prohibitionist and had the distinction of being the only man in our county to vote for the Prohibition candidate for President.

A few years ago he had his will written, in which he stated his desire to make arrangements for his funeral. He wanted the funeral to be held in the Paris Grand Opera House, the funeral oration to be delivered by either Mrs. Josephine Henry, of Versailles, or Dr. Wilson of Cincinnati, both noted free-thinkers, and stated that he wanted a brass band playing the National airs, to head the funeral procession to the Paris cemetery.

Down at Owensboro it used to cost a fellow with a plain "jag" \$1 and trimmings; and then the price was raised along with other luxuries to \$5 and pers. Last week Judge Pinkston, thinking perhaps that if a fellow had sufficient funds to buy the "licker" nowadays he certainly had enough to pay for his fine along the war-price and he raised the ante to such an extent that it now takes a whole week's wages to pay for the "fun" a fellow had the hour or two before sunrise.
