STATE TEXT BOOK BOARD HOLDS MEET BEHIND CLOSED DOORS

Commission Selecting School Books For Use in the State Out Newspaper Men Against Gov. Black's Will.

Frankfort, Ky., July 1.—Notwithstanding the fact that the State Text Book Commission went on record Monday in favor of open sessions, the deliberations of the commission Tuesday were held behind closed doors. The members of the commission assembled Tuesday in the Senate chamber, where representatives of publishing concerns, newspaper representatives and persons interested in the adoption of text books had gathered for the purpose of attending the open session of the commission. One by one the members drifted into the private office of presiding officer of Senate, and on motion of Professor E. C. McDougale, of the Eastern State Normal School, seconded by Professor Paul Anderson, of the University of Kentucky, the commission voted for an executive session for the purpose of deciding on rules and regulations of procedure.

Governor James D. Black stood firm for an open session, believing it best for the commission that the sessions be held in this manner. In spite of his views the commission adopted a rule providing that "no minutes of the executive session of this commission shall be made public until they have been approved and signed."

Executive sessions for the consideration and adoption of books are also favored by the commission. When the executive session rule was established Governor Black was notified in an undertone that press representatives were present. He said, "Let them remain." But remain they did not, for the commission had the deciding vote. A member of the commission jokingly remarked at this point that he thought it would be a good idea to look around and see if a dictograph had been installed in the room.

The commission gave the publishers permission to submit briefs to individual members of the body, and if any information be desired from the companies submitting proposals and bids the commission reserves the right to call upon the companies for such information.

In following out the decision of the Court of Appeals the commission first will consider the proposals. Books of such subjects will be taken up in alphabetical order, provided the adoption of books for the elementary schools shall be completed before the adoption of high school subjects are considered. Bids will then be considered in the same order as proposals.

The commission remained in executive session all day considering proposals and condition submitted with them by the publishers. The difficulty the commission is experiencing is in ascertaining books submitted at the present price and in selecting books offered at the price now in effect. The commission is silent as to any of the conditions and proposals submitted.
