



22 DRY OFFICERS ARE NOW ON DUTY IN KENTUCKY

Two Additional Dry Agents Take the Oath of Office and Will Work in the Eastern District.

Thomas H. Patrick, of Royalton, and John T. Beckner, of London, who recently were appointed prohibition agents on the enforcement staff of Director Sam Collins, were in Lexington Friday to take the oath of office.

For the present they both will be assigned to the Eastern Kentucky district, it was said. The appointment of these agents makes twenty-two men on duty in the state, exclusive of Director Collins and Judge B. J. Bathurum, newly appointed legal advisor, leaving eleven appointments to be made to bring the enforcement staff up to the authorized strength of thirty-three men.

Elwood Hamilton, counsel for the Kolb Brothers, wholesale druggists, of Paducah, has filed with Director Collins a brief of the case heard in Louisville recently, in which the defendant firm was summoned to show cause why its whisky permit should not be revoked, it was announced at the prohibition office. The record is being copied and as soon as this work is completed, which will be done within the next few days, a copy of the record with Director Collins' recommendation will be forwarded to Prohibition Commissioner Haynes at Washington, Director Collins said.

The recommendation of the Kentucky director will not be made known until it is approved by Commissioner Haynes, it was said.

This case developed from the seizure by Federal prohibition agents of a truck load of whisky near Frankfort several weeks ago, which has been removed from a distillery on Kolb Brothers' permit with the ostensible purpose of shipping it by truck to Paducah. When captured the liquor truck was headed toward Lexington.

INTEREST IS TAKEN IN CHRISTIANITY CONFERENCE

Proposed Meeting Here at Which Leaders in Christian Thought Will Participate Creates Interest.

The proposed program includes some of the greatest thinkers and writers in America and would give Maysvillians an opportunity seldom given a city of this size.

The conferences are being held throughout the country for the purpose of combatting a wave of skepticism which seems to be sweeping the country. The Diet of Christ, His virgin birth and other questions are proposed for discussion throughout the service which would probably last for a week with services in the afternoon and evening and new speakers each day.

Arrangements are now being made for the series of meetings in Huntington, Ashland, Ironton and Portsmouth and Maysville is proposed for the fifth city in the circuit. Local religious leaders are very anxious for the completion of arrangements.

SLATTERY REMOVED AS U. S. ATTORNEY BY EXECUTIVE ORDER

Maysville Man Is Ousted and Sawyer Smith Is Immediately Nominated as His Successor—Makes Statement.

Immediately after the office had been declared vacant, Sawyer A. Smith, of Harboursville, prominent corporation lawyer, was nominated by President Harding to be United States Attorney for the Eastern District of Kentucky Thursday.

Thomas D. Slattery, United States District Attorney, who had repeatedly refused requests of Attorney General Daugherty that he resign, and defied the Republican administration to oust him, was removed by Department of Justice officials to pave the way for the appointment of Mr. Smith.

The war waged by District Attorney Slattery and the Department of Justice officials dates back to shortly after the inauguration of President Harding. According to report, District Attorney Slattery then received an unpublished request to resign. No charge was made against him in the request. He refused to resign, saying that he believed that, as the administration found no fault with his services, he should be allowed to serve out his term.

This refusal brought another request, couched in stronger terms, again asking him to resign. He then made a public statement, saying: "I will not resign."

This public statement, sent broadcast through the press, signaled action by Attorney General Daugherty. The Attorney General wired him to resign at once. Again the District Attorney flatly refused, this time saying he would, however, as a subordinate official, submit to whatever action the Washington administration might see fit to take.

The removal of the District Attorney Thursday followed. The District Attorney had served seven years.

District Attorney Slattery issued a statement in which he said in part: "I have not been officially notified of my removal, but I presume from the Washington dispatches that the President has taken action."

"I have taken the position from the first that I was within my legal and moral rights in refusing to conform to the request of the Attorney General to resign. It is to be regretted that the Department of Justice finds itself unable to resist the demands of political expediency.

"I have served seven years and three months as District Attorney, and under four Attorney Generals, and it is gratifying to know that all of them, with the possible exception of Mr. Daugherty, have by correspondence manifested their appreciation of the manner in which the office has been conducted. While I have accepted Mr. Daugherty, I should say that his examiner, Mr. Masterson, who recently completed his examination of this office took occasion to personally congratulate me upon the splendid record of same.

"I have formed many friendships during my term of office, which I shall always cherish fondly, and I want to say that it has been a real pleasure to have served under such an able and conscientious Judge as Hon. A. M. J. Cochran.

"I shall retain my partnership at Maysville, Ky., and have taken an office in the Dixie Terminal Building at Cincinnati and shall practice my profession both in Kentucky and Ohio."

Mr. Smith, who succeeds District Attorney Slattery, is well known to residents of Covington. He served as Assistant District Attorney in 1910, when Governor Edwin P. Morrow was District Attorney of the Eastern District of Kentucky. He is one of the most prominent Republicans in Kentucky, an intimate friend of Governor Morrow and an acquaintance of President Harding.

Mr. Smith's early political career was brilliant. Shortly after becoming of age he was elected County Prosecutor of Knox county, of which his home city, Harboursville, is the county seat. After serving a term as County Prosecutor he was elected to the State Legislature, where he served two terms and was Republican floor leader.

In 1910 he was named Assistant District Attorney by Governor Morrow and served one term until 1914. Since 1914 he has enjoyed an extensive private practice, and, together with his partner, Judge A. Sampson has served as counsel in some of the largest corporation cases heard in Kentucky courts in the last decade.

He then took Mrs. Rapp and her child under his protecting arm and proceeded to hold the fort.

When Mrs. Rapp's father, Hamp DePriest, and Mr. Rapp, appeared for the child, Plummer ordered them away in a voice punctuated with the appearance of a loaded shot gun.

The men told Plummer that they wouldn't argue just then, but would get the sheriff, so he left for other regions Friday and Deputy Sheriffs Arthur Crago and Charles Logan arrived in Frankfort ten minutes too late. There is a report, unconfirmed, that Mrs. Rapp disappeared with Plummer.
