ATTORNEY GENERAL SAYS MAYSVILLE IS IN THE THIRD CLASS

General Dawson gives Opinion on Maysville's Classification in Letter to Mr. Sherman Arn.

The following is Attorney General Dawson's opinion on Maysville's classification given Mr. Sherman Arn: Frankfort, Ky., October 21, 1921. Mr. Sherman Arn, Maysville, Ky. Dear Sir:— I have your letter of October 20th in which you desire to know in what class the City of Maysville now is, and what city officers, if any, are to be elected this fall in the City of Maysville.

Chapter 164, page 696, of the Acts of 1920, makes Maysville a city of the third class. This bill was passed, enrolled and signed on March 17th, 1920, and carried an emergency clause. It was neither approved nor disapproved by the Governor, and therefore, under the decisions of the Court in similar cases, this law became effective on the day of its passage.

Chapter 164 expressly provides that all officers holding office at the time of the passage of that act, in any of the cities changed from one class to another, shall continue in office until the end of their respective terms. Maysville, prior to the passage of Chapter 164 of the Acts of 1920, was a city of the fourth class and of course had the officers provided for by law for fourth class cities. These officers continue to serve until their terms have expired, at which time there must be elected the officers provided by law for third class cities.

There should be no difficulty in this matter, and I would advise you to consult your City Attorney in order to know what officers, if any, are to be elected in Maysville this fall. The last day for filing nomination petitions for city officers will be October 24th.

TIME FOR FILING OF CITY PETITIONS CLOSED ON MONDAY

Complete Ticket is Made Up on Monday When Time Limit for filing Ends—Most Candidates to Stand Pat and Insist on Running.

Despite the opinion rendered by Attorney General Dawson to Mr. Sherman Arn that Maysville is now a third class city and officers should be elected as is provided in this class, which means that the offices of City Clerk, Collector and Treasurer, Police Chief and Assessor are filled by Council after nomination by the Mayor, most candidates for these offices are standing pat and insisting on making the race contending that the Attorney General is in error.

CITY'S OLDEST CITIZEN DIED EARLY LAST NIGHT

Mrs. Martha Bridges, 96 Years of Age. Died at West Second Street Home After Illness of Only Few Days.

Mrs. Martha Bridges, 96 years of age, probably the oldest citizen of the city of Maysville, died at her home in West Second street at 6:30 o'clock Monday evening. Mrs. Bridges had been in splendid health, considering her advanced age, until last Sunday when at about 9 o'clock at night she was taken ill and since that time gradually sank until the end came.

Mrs. Bridges was born in Adams county on August 8th, 1825, but had resided in Maysville during the greater part of her long life. She was greatly beloved by all who knew her and counted her friends by the hundreds.

She is survived by five daughters, Misses Martha and Vina Bridges, and Mrs. Frank Bromley, of this city, Mrs. C. M. Tudor, of Portsmouth, Ohio, and Mrs. Anna Wilson, of Nicco, Florida.

Funeral will be held from the home Wednesday morning at 10:30 o'clock with services by Rev. Seavers, pastor of the First M. E. Church, South. Burial in the Maysville Cemetery.

GREAT MEETING ON RAILROAD STRIKE TO OPEN WEDNESDAY

U. S. Railroad Labor Board Believes There Is "Great Reason" to Hope Strike Will Be Averted.

Chicago, Oct. 25. — There is "great reason" to hope the rail strike will be averted, according to a statement made by the United States Railroad Labor Board, which also counseled all "good Americans" to refrain from loose talk about either side of the controversy.

At the conference beginning here Wednesday, every player is expected to put his cards, face up, on the table. The Federal Labor Board has engaged "the Coliseum annex and the hearing will be open to the public.

This is the first time the public, which pays all the bills and endures all the discomforts of a strike, has had an opportunity to sit in. It is believed the conferences will last until next Sunday morning, the date set by the Brotherhoods for their general strike.

Five hundred general chairmen of the unions have been summoned to attend and these "invitations" are practically mandatory. These men occupy positions of influence and power in this situation which makes their presence absolutely necessary.

Rail executives are also expected to attend and there will be no room left for "passing the buck" to absentees on either side.

Additional complications arose for the Brotherhoods Monday when the 15,000 members of the Signalmen's Union refused to join in the strike. They will remain at their posts, but will refuse to be shifted to any other duty to fill vacancies left by strikers.

This makes ten of the eleven "standard unions" voting against a strike. Officers of the Railroad Telegraphers' Union denied rumors that they were near a break with the Brotherhoods. President E. J. Manion said some locals in his organization might continue at work, but he believed the large majority of the telegraphers would walk out with the Brotherhoods. This would seriously interfere with the movement of trains, even though the rail executives are able to man all the trains.

SAWYER SMITH TAKES OATH AS DISTRICT ATTORNEY

New U. S. District Attorney Took Oath and Began Duties on Monday Succeeding Slattery.

The new United States District Attorney, Sawyer Smith of Harboursville, arrived in Covington Monday morning and a few minutes later took the oath of office administered by Judge A. M. J. Cochran. Former District Attorney Thomas D. Slattery, who was recently removed from office by President Harding, was not present.

Edward Gault, Assistant District Attorney, tendered his resignation, which was accepted by District Attorney Smith and forwarded to the Department of Justice, Washington. Henry Clay Kauffman, Assistant District Attorney will remain to complete the prosecution of the criminal docket at this term of court.

District Attorney Smith said that he had made no recommendations as to his probable assistants. These appointments will be announced from the Department of Justice, Washington. Their selections are made on the recommendation of the new District Attorney.

JUMPS FROM A HOTEL WINDOW TO HER DEATH

Newport Girl Jumps From Lafayette Hotel Window at Lexington—Gossip Is Charged As Cause.

Body of Miss Dorothy Rainey, 26, off 11 East Sixth street, Newport, who plunged to her death when she leaped from a fifth-story window of the Lafayette Hotel, Lexington, Ky., early Tuesday, will arrive in Newport late Tuesday.

A remark overheard at the race track at Lexington Monday afternoon is believed to have caused Miss Rainey to end her life, according to dispatches.

Carl Wiedemann, son of George Wiedemann, president of the Wiedemann Brewing Co., Newport, who accompanied Miss Rainey to Lexington, will return with her body.

Wiedemann, according to Lexington police, saw the young woman leap to her death. He was unable to reach her in time.

Wiedemann and Miss Rainey arrived in Lexington Monday to attend the races. Miss Rainey is said to have overheard a remark about herself made by another party in a nearby box at the race track.

She became despondent, police were told, but appeared to become normal, when she, Wiedemann, J. B. Richardson, Lexington agent of the Wiedemann Co., and another man dined at the hotel.

One of the party is said to have planned taking some friends to E. R. Bradley's "Idle Hour" farm, near Lexington, later in the evening, but Miss Rainey declined to accompany them. It is said, Wiedemann, according to Lexington police, returned to the hotel to see if she had changed her mind.

He found her seated on the window sill, police were told, and persuaded her to leave that position. He closed the window.

As Wiedemann started to leave the room, police were informed, Miss Rainey ran to the window, swung her feet over the sill and dropped from sight.

She was dressed in street clothes and fell almost in front of the hotel entrance. Almost before passers-by knew what had happened, Wiedemann had rushed downstairs, lifted the body into his auto and started for a hospital. Physicians said Miss Rainey died instantly.
