## PACIFIC TREATY IS LAID BEFORE CONFERENCE.

Washington, Dec. 10. — Birth of the quadruple Pacific union which scraps the Anglo-Japanese alliance was to be heralded to the world today at the fourth plenary session of the Arms Conference.

The American delegation was to announce agreement between the United States, Great Britain, Japan and France, to preserve the peace of the Pacific. Senator Henry Cabot Lodge was to speak for the United States.

The announcement today will mark the first big definite success of the conference.

## WORK BEING DONE BY STATE TUBERCULOSIS ASSOCIATION

Christmas Seal Campaign Helps Finance Work Being Done By State Tuberculosis Association.

The Kentucky Tuberculosis Association maintains sixty trained nurses engaged in public health work in Kentucky and of this number 15 are doing school work exclusively. Educational work is carried on 365 days of the year under auspices of this office.

One thousand and two people were examined in the tuberculosis clinics of five counties last year.

The state sanatorium at Hazelwood is in full operation, managed by this association.

The seal sale which began November 24 goes to support this anti-tuberculosis work.

The results that this association has achieved are wonderful. There were 1959 fewer deaths of tuberculosis in 1920 than in 1911.

Twenty-five per cent. of the proceeds of sale of these seals in Mason county go to support these activities and the remaining seventy-five per cent. is expended by the local Health League in anti-tuberculosis work at home and along with other measures destined to prevent disease and improve sanitation generally.

Eleven hundred dollars worth of seals have been allotted to this county. These should be sold in two weeks. Boyd county is endeavoring to sell \$4,000 worth of seals with the greatest assurance of success. One hundred per cent. "Physically Fit" for every child in Kentucky is the goal of the state association and the Christmas seals will finance this work.

## HARDING FAVORS BONUS BILL.

Harding wishes Congress to pass the bonus bill, he said, as soon as collection of the \$3,500,000,000 or \$4,000,000,000 of the \$11,000,000,000 debt is made certain.
