CHAMBLIN MUST DIE ON FRIDAY MORNING

Ohio Supreme Court Refuses to Review Case of Portsmouth Murderer—Second Reprieve Not Likely.

Columbus, Ohio, March 23. — Roy Chamblin of Portsmouth must die in the electric chair at the penitentiary after Thursday midnight unless Governor Harry L. Davis grants a reprieve. The state Supreme Court today overruled Chamblin's application to have his case reviewed.

Chamblin was convicted of the murder of a Portsmouth girl and her male companion on a lonely road several miles outside of that city last fall. Governor Davis previously had granted to Chamblin a stay of execution in order that he might appeal his case, and it was stated at the executive office today that the Chief Executive is not expected to interfere further with the carrying out of the decree of the courts.

Edward Moffett of Akron, convicted wife murderer, also is under sentence to be electrocuted at the same time. The Supreme Court recently denied him a review also.
