OREGON CAMP, April 27, 1845.

ONE DAY LATER FROM MEXICO.—The schooner Creole, arrived yesterday from Vera Cruz, having left that city on the 22d ult., one day after the Yucateca. We have received by her a Diario de Vera Cruz, of the 22d, but it is absolutely destitute of news.

A Zacatecas paper mentions the explosion of a powder manufactory situated on the road to Guadalupe, by which the building was completely destroyed, and the proprietor and several operatives were killed or wounded.

A passenger on board the Creole informs us that the shocks of the earthquake were still repeated, and that the explosion of the powder magazine noticed above, was occasioned by one of these convulsions.

With respect to Texas, the Mexican government appears disposed to recognize her independence, and is willing to select France and England as umpires.

Verbal communications from some of the passengers by the Creole represent that the general feeling at Vera Cruz is in favor of a war, and that the prevailing impression there is that the Government will declare it so soon as it finds itself in a situation to do so with effect.

THE four American vessels of war were still lying at Sacrificios. Should Captain Stockton's squadron join them, as is anticipated, the fleet will consist of eight vessels of war, amounting in all to 154 guns.

By this arrival we hear not a word more of Mr. Shannon, the American Minister.

PROGRESS OF OUR COUNTY.

It enters not into the conception of any mind, what is to be the vast progress of our country. A very intelligent writer sets it down as a matter about which there can be but little doubt, that the United States are destined ultimately to command mainly the trade in the India and China seas.

The English government hope, by commanding the exclusive route of China over Egypt by way of the Nile and the Isthmus of Suez, [to effect which, a negotiation is now pending between that power and the Pacha,] to obtain news several weeks earlier than it can be had in the United States—an advantage which will give her merchants control of the markets.

The occupation of the vast territory known as the Oregon, is already going forward; and twenty years will not have elapsed, before a powerful state will have sprung up on the shores of the Pacific.

These islands are situated in the middle of the Pacific, on the great highway from Oregon to China. The great whale fishery of these regions, is conducted mostly by Americans, numbering 100 vessels, whose annual products, are about \$5,000,000.

THE whole of this vast trade, and of China, via the Sandwich Islands, will be commanded by the State of Oregon. Those persons are now living who will see a railroad connecting New York with the Pacific, and a steam communication from Oregon to China.
