Struck by Lightning.

During the storm on Wednesday evening of last week, Mr. John A. Shaw was struck by lightning and severely shocked. He and his hired man were out in the woods with a team, and when the rain began falling took shelter under a beech tree. Mr. Shaw told his man to take the team from under the tree, as he feared lightning might be attracted by the wagon. The team was removed some distance, and Mr. Shaw had just stepped a few feet from the tree against which he was standing, when the bolt descended shattering the trunk. A spark struck him about the shoulder tearing off the clothes on his arm, descending his leg scorching the skin and ripping his pants, and by stung loose the sole from his boot.

Mr. Shaw was in town on Tuesday and received the hearty congratulations from his many friends for his narrow escape from death by the touch of the "Spark Eterial."

He says he was knocked down, paralyzed, but retained consciousness all the time, knew what was the matter, observed what was going on, but was perfectly helpless. He describes the sensation in his arm and leg as similar to the feeling of being "asleep" but at the same time experiencing an intense pain. The man with him and off some distance with the team under another tree, says that when the bolt descended, Shaw seemed to be covered with flames. The stroke was a heavy one and jarred the country for some distance around.

Mr. Shaw's escape is almost miraculous. Had he been standing against the tree which was struck, his death would have been instantaneous. He caught only a stray spark, but his experience we hope, will impress upon all the oft repeated warning not to take shelter under a tree during a thunder storm.

His experience also explodes the old time notion that beech trees are not struck by lightning. As a rule they are not because they are generally found on low ground and when with other trees are not so high but a beech tree, if a tree of fair proportions with other trees about it is just as likely to be struck as any other tree.

The lesson to be learned from Mr. Shaw's experience and the experience of mankind is to keep away from trees during a thunder storm.
