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TAXES FOR THE YEAR 1890.

Notice to the Tax Payers of Hocking County, Ohio.

In pursuance of law, I, Benjamin H. Allen, Treasurer of said County of Hocking in the State of Ohio, hereby notify the Tax Payers thereof, that the rates of taxation for the year A. D. 1890, are correctly stated in the following table, showing the number of mills and tenths of mills, levied on each and every dollar of taxable property in each Township of said County.

The following are the provisions of the Act of April 2, 1859, with reference to the semi-annual collection of taxes: The law declares: "That each person charged with taxes on the Tax Duplicate in the hands of the County Treasurer, may, at his option, pay half or the full amount of such taxes on or before the 20th day of December; and the remaining half on or before the 20th day of June, next ensuing."
