THE OUTLOOK

Indicating a Glorious Result, In the Election of Honest Thad Cromley and the Entire Democratic State and Congressional Ticket.

Cogent Reasons for a Popular Triumph. The Democrats of Ohio have a glorious opportunity to win a grand victory on Tuesday next. On the platform of the lowest taxation consistent with the public interest they began the campaign many months ahead of the Republican party, which at the very start declared for higher taxation, and that at a time when the necessities of life were the highest and times never so bad in ten years. They remembered a practical farmer who has toiled upon his land all his life and whose heart was in natural sympathy with the toiling masses. The Republican nominated a lawyer and a politician; a man whose life was engrossed with the care of politics, and whose impulses were not with the common people. The selection was characteristic of both parties—the Democratic party always contending for the masses and the Republican party standing out for the classes.

With a knowledge of these facts the campaign entered upon its course and has now about run its career. The indications are flattering to the success of the Democracy. They made their fight against increased taxes and in favor of cheaper necessities of life. The iniquity of the McKinley bill as it goes through on the land robbing right and left, have been thoroughly exposed. From all points of the Ohio compass comes tidings of political comfort and great joy. The Republicans concede the election of 18 Democratic Congressmen whose votes will be against the high protection robbery and against the shameful Free bill to stifle public sentiment opposed to the party in power. They will vote against the tyranny and despotism which despoiled a dozen Democratic members of Congress of their seats. But the Ohio Democracy will elect more than twelve Congressmen. They will elect fifteen out of the twenty-one. From every county comes words of cheer and hope for Thad Cromley, the candidate of the farmers and the masses. The stand taken by the Republican members of the Legislature against honest government in Cincinnati has disgusted thousands of their party friends and they will stay away from the polls on Tuesday. Senator Brice expresses hope and confidence in the result. The Democratic State Committee is satisfied with the result. Politicians who have observed the situation with keen eyes give assurances of Democratic success. The very air seems fragrant with the perfume of Democratic triumph. Let every Democrat in Ohio take the hope and go forth to the polls on November 4, and the triumph of that day will be as glorious as was that of one year ago.

MERCHANTS everywhere are telling their customers about the rise in prices and advising them to make their purchases now. The price of everything has gone up. The wages of workmen have either remained the same or gone down.

THINGS have not been so hard in ten years as now, and yet the Republican party has advanced the price of nearly every necessity of life. Seal skin saques, of course, have been reduced in price. This gives the working girls a chance.

The Republican party has practically bankrupted the country. They entered into the emoluments of office with some thing like one hundred million dollars in the treasury of the United States. Since that time they have not only squandered that sum but they have landed the country in debt. This money was paid out in pensions to the Grand Army veterans, not because of their loyalty, but because it was thought they would cast their ballots for the candidates presented by the Republican party. In other words they assigned the vote of the soldiers could be purchased with the money filched from the people by an oppressive high tariff. Not only were they expecting to profit from this source, but it was building up monopolies and trusts which in turn would contribute their thousands and tens of thousands to Republican campaign funds.
