A POKER

Seems to be All That is Required to Break the Wall of the County Bastile.

Jake Robinson, thus Forces his way to Freedom,

But is Recaptured at Nelsonville.

The first successful attempt to break jail ever happening in this county, occurred on Monday night.

Mr. O. W. H. Wright, the colored prisoner, who is languishing in default of bail, for attempting to shoot a colored woman, in Ward Tp., an account of which was published in the SENTINEL some weeks since, made his escape by removing a portion of the wall under the sill of the south window on the east side of the jail and crawling through the aperture.

For some time Robison has claimed to be sick with lung trouble and this claim was substantiated by the report of the jail physician, in consequence of which he was removed first to the second story of the jail and given the freedom of the corridors.

The walls of the second story are constructed of brick and plastered on the inside. On Monday night, Robison took the iron poker and removed the brick from beneath the stone window sill, and with the aid of a bed-comfort, to deaden the noise, removed the debris to one of the cells.

A couple of blankets torn into strips and trusted together formed a rope by which he lowered himself to the yard below.

The yard is inclosed with an eight foot iron fence, over which Robison says he vaulted, a feat that is wonderful to contemplate considering that he was half dead with consumption.

Sheriff Ryan did not discover that the bastile had been broken until he went to take the prisoner's breakfast.

The sheriff says that he understood that one lung of Robison was entirely gone, and he was much surprised when on Tuesday morning he discovered that the other was gone also.

After the escape he at once returned to Nelsonville where he was recognized and arrested.

He was returned to jail on Tuesday evening, from which his chances of escape will be infinitesimally slim.
