From the monthly summary of the Weather Bureau, we are enabled to give our readers the following statistics which mark the last month as phenomenal. The month is remarkable for low temperature, hail and sleet, but the absence of frost. The highest temperature was 98 degrees at Portsmouth on the 14th day. The lowest was 31 degrees on the 29, 30 and 31, in the region of Rittman, Benton Ridge and Findlay. Mean temperature for month was 69 degrees. Total rainfall, average inches and rain fell on 13 days during month. There were but 8 clear days 11, cloudy and 12 partly cloudy. While there was no frosts reported, there was hail on the 6, 7, 10, 17, 18, 24, 25, 26, 30 and 31, and sleet on the 19, 30 and 31. We doubt if the memory of living man can recall another such May.
