Our War Correspondent

IN GREAT TROUBLE. HE HAS TAKEN PRISONERS AND DON'T KNOW WHAT TO DO WITH HIS CAPTIVES.

In an Bad a Fix as the Managers of Our Administration. Has Caught a Tartar. Two of Them Outside of Santiago.

Our Bold War Correspondent Has Overdone Himself.

Our war correspondent at Santiago while prowling around the commissary department in the rear of the army where the Columbus war correspondents who telegraph from the front, can always be found, he discovered, sitting on the tail board of a Sutlers wagon two suspicious looking characters, one eating Swiss cheese, the other reading over a list of names copied from a near by grave yard. War News.

The Spanish fleet, attempted to escape from the harbor of Santiago on July 3rd and was destroyed, all the ships were sunk and 1800 prisoners taken.

The Spanish General Pando, with 6000 soldiers, succeeded in entering Santiago.

The bombardment of Santiago is postponed until Gen. Shafter is reinforced, and more time given for the foreigners and non combatants to leave the city.

The Rough Riders sustained serious loss in the assaults made on the Spanish defenses. Out of a regiment of about 600, more than 300 have been killed. The loss of our troops is placed at from one to two thousand. The loss of the Spaniards is estimated to be much greater.

Re-enforcements are hastening to Gen. Shafter.

The expedition to Spain, by our fleet, has been delayed awaiting the attack on Santiago.

Details of the war, up to last Monday are given on the 2nd. page of this issue.

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A Frightful Catastrophe

SIX HUNDRED PEOPLE DROWNED OFF SABLE ISLAND.

The Splendid French Steamer La Bourgoyne That Left New York City on July 2nd for Harve

Collides with the Ship Cromartyshire and Sinks to the Bottom of the Sea.

A large Number of the passengers were Americans going abroad to spend a few months.

Of the 800 human beings aboard 200 were saved—30 of the crew and 170 passengers. Only one woman survivor, of the officer, purser and engineers got out alive.

HALIFAX, July 6.—The vessels were running at full speed, and owing to the dense fog did not see each other until the collision occurred.

The Cromartyshire, was badly injured, but sent boats out, succeeding in picking up 200 persons. Of 300 women on board, only one was saved. The French vessel went down within ten minutes after the collision. Six hundred persons went down with the ship.

GEN. G. G. GAGE desires his friends, the public, to know that on the glorious 4th, escorting Senator Lowry, made a visit of state to the Athens Hospital for the Insane, and while there was the public guest of the state and the personal recipient of a dinner from Steward Rochester and Superintendent Borick. The General says he finds things in excellent condition, the only difference was that on former occasions when he visited the Asylum under Democratic rule, he walked to the place and went to work when he got there. Now he was taken in a carriage of State and when he arrived was given the hospitality of the Institution. In the city of Athens, which he subsequently visited, he was taken in charge by the dignitaries and escorted to all places of attraction and interest. He is under obligations to Dr. Goodspeed and Marshal Earhart for special attention. The General, notwithstanding the good opinion he entertains for the Republicans in power at Athens and at the Asylum, is still a Democrat.
