Conduct of the Philippine War.

The Republican Plan of Benevolent Assimilation.

In the elaborate interview given out relating to his administration, civil and military, before leaving Manila, General Otis, of course stating the islands were pacified and "the rebellion at an end," illustrated the way peace was maintained, if the incessant partisan and guerrilla war going on and can be called peace, in the statement that he was maintaining 116 military posts, properly garrisoned, north of Manila and 94 south of that city. These, with very few exceptions, are all on the island of Luzon. Therefore to hold these well disposed Filipinos in control, for it is claimed only a small minority are hostile and the "best elements" are friendly, it is necessary to maintain 210 military posts, with provost marshal attachments. Luzon is about the same size as the state of Pennsylvania and has probably a million less population. There are 67 counties in this state, and to occupy the State in a military way, as Luzon is held down, would necessitate two garrisoned military posts in every county of the State, with 74 over, which would allow half a dozen military strongholds in each of the more populous counties. But besides this force scattered over the country in Luzon, a garrison of 5,000 is maintained in Manila, with a large fleet in and about that port. The need of the army of 70,000 we have in the Philippines is therefore apparent. Good judges say it is not large enough as matters stand, and it is an accepted military fact that to maintain health and life, the American soldiers cannot stand service there for more than two years. The army will have to be renewed every two years. This way of stating the case may possibly impress some of the imperialists, open to reason and facts, what conquest and subjugation in the far East means to the American people in the way of blood and money.

A Manila letter of March 30, giving an account of the ambushing and killing of Lieutenant Koehler, of the Ninth infantry, throws light on the peculiar kind of service required of our soldiers. The lieutenant was judge of the provost court, and "rounded up" the town, imprisoning all the male inhabitants. Soon after 29 of this number were picked out as extra rebellious and were closely confined. Under pressure, which in a vague way hints at torture, some of these prisoners consented to guide Lieutenant Koehler to where the Filipinos secreted arms. While with these men, the party run into an ambush and the Lieutenant was killed. This appears to have all been in the way of war. But when the news reached the guard left over the 29 Filipino prisoners in the village, it is alleged they made a movement to escape. What followed is related in a soldier's letter, printed in the New York "Sun" which says:

"It needed no one to tell the guard what should be done. However, the command was given by Captain Sigworth. "Bang!" went the rifle of every guard, and in two minutes twentyseven out of the band of twenty-nine treacherous beings were shot. The other two escaped. The insurgent colonel and his wife were taken out of their houses at the suggestion of Lieutenant Hammond and the place was consigned to the flames. By this time Lieutenant Frazier was on the scene, and he took the initiative in the further devastation of the insurgent village.

The destruction of the town was complete, and even though Tinubia is still on the map, I assure you that no such place in reality now exists, and the people of the treacherous

This is war in the Philippines, and it does not differ much from the way our beloved British brethren are carrying it on in South Africa, also in advancing a "higher civilization" and developing curious processes of "benevolent assimilation." A dispatch from the seat of war, north of Bloomfonten, describing the charge on a Boer laager, says:

A white flag had been hoisted, but just at that moment some Boer let go a shot, and then there was no stopping us. I saw lots of our chaps sink the bayonet in, turn it around, slide their fingers along to take off the blood and then club the old chaps with the butt end. The first man I came to held up his bible with both hands, down on his knees as he was and then trying to crawl up and kiss my blooming feet.

"Moody boss," he says. That means "You mustn't boss." But I had no mercy for the beggar and did like the others. God's truth, the slaughter in that laager was something to remember.

Narratives like this one hears at every street corner.

How true what General Sherman said, that "war is hell." These two episodes in war, originated by McKinley and Chamberlain, with equal culpability, recall the fact that at The Hague Peace Conference, Great Britain and the United States led in the movement for peaceable arbitration. Yet the Filipinos offered arbitration and peace to McKinley, as Kruger did to Chamberlain, but both offers were contemptuously rejected.
