Death of Dunstan H. Willard

Our former townsman D. H. Willard died on Sunday morning in the 73rd year of his age at Baird's Furnace, where for the last nine years he was in charge of the property, and where he made his home. For a year or more past he was in declining health, and his death was not unexpected. The funeral was on Monday, interment in Oak Grove cemetery by the side of his wife and son. The religious exercises were conducted by Rev. T. B. White of the M. E. Church, who read the Episcopal burial service, to which church the deceased was a devoted member. The funeral was attended by neighbors of his Furnace acquaintances. The coffin was covered with flowers which he had grown in the yard and garden of his home. Mr. Willard was a New Yorker by birth, but most of his life was spent in Ohio, identified with the iron interests of the Hanging Rock region. About 40 years ago he came to Logan and had charge of the Logan Furnace. From here he went to Zanesville, conducted the large hardware store of Palmer, Willard and Cox, and was also interested with Gen. Sam Thomas and the Cureshills in the iron works of that city. He was a partner of Hugh J. Jewett of Zanesville at Point Pleasant and in Michigan in the lumber business. The floods destroyed his property on the river and the fires burned him out in Michigan, Columbus Delano, Secretary of the Interior, appointed him an inspector of the Union Pacific railroad. He came to Logan when Mr. Pursell was appointed postmaster on his second term, and took Editorial charge of Mr. Pursell's paper, the Republican Gazette. Retiring from this paper, he engaged with the Hocking SENTINEL for several years. He was employed by Mr. R. D. McManigal in his Brick works at Middleport, and afterwards with Raimy Baird in an iron commission store in Philadelphia, from which service he came to Baird's Furnace and took charge of this property continuing to his death. He was married to Miss Spive in Marietta who died four years ago. His son Parker died from an accident at Charleston. His sister-in-law Mrs. Dr. Cotton of Marietta and Mrs. Sam Baird and their children are his only near surviving relatives.

AN ORDINANCE

To Regulate the Hitching of Horses on the Improved Part of Main Street in the Village of Logan, Ohio. Be it ordained by the Council of the Village of Logan, Ohio: Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any owner or occupant of any lot or building abutting upon the paved portion of Main Street in the Village of Logan, Ohio, to erect or permit to be erected or maintained, any hitch post in front of said lot or building, or any portion of said street or sidewalk thereon. Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any owner or occupant of any lot or building abutting upon the paved portion of Main Street in the Village of Logan, Ohio, to erect or permit to be erected or maintained, any hitch post in front of said lot or building, or any portion of said street or sidewalk thereon. Section 3. It shall be the duty of any person having charge of any horse, team or any other animal, to keep the same under control at all times, and to prevent the same from obstructing the sidewalk or street, or from interfering with the free use of the same. Section 4. The violation of sections 1, 2 or 3 of this ordinance shall be deemed to be a misdemeanor, and any person or persons so violating said sections either of them shall be liable to a fine not exceeding \$25.00. AN ORDINANCE

To Levy Taxes for Municipal Purposes for the Year 1906. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF LOGAN, OHIO: Section 1. That there be levied and collected for municipal purposes for the year 1906, on each dollar of valuation of the real and personal property within the Village of Logan, returned on the great duplicate and subject to taxation, 9.55 mills. Section 2. That the levy above authorized for municipal purposes be and the same is hereby apportioned as follows: Fire Department.....2.50 mills Health Department......40 mills Police Department......75 mills Road......1.00 mills Section 3. That there be levied and collected on each dollar of the property assessed for the year 1906, the following additional sums: Sinking Fund......75 mills Free Public Library......40 mills Total......4.65 mills To wit: That the Clerk is hereby directed to certify the above levies to the Auditor of the State of Ohio, and to file the same on the tax list and collect according to law. Section 4. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances heretofore passed that are inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed. Section 5. PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF OHIO. BIENNIAL ELECTIONS FOR STATE, COUNTY AND LOCAL OFFICES. Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Ohio: SECTION I. That a proposition shall be submitted to the electors of this state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1906, to amend the constitution of the state of Ohio, said amendment to be designated "Article XVII" and to read as follows: ARTICLE XVII. SECTION 1. Elections for state and county officers shall be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November in the odd numbered years, and all elections for even numbered years shall be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November in the even numbered years. SECTION 2. The term of office of the governor, lieutenant governor, attorney-general, secretary of state and treasurer of the state shall be two years, and that of the auditor of public accounts shall be four years, and that of the judges of the supreme court and circuit courts shall be six years, and that of the judges of the common pleas court six (6) years, and that of the judges of the probate court four (4) years, and that of other judges shall be such even number of years not exceeding six (6) years, and may be prescribed by the general assembly. The term of office of the members of the board of public works shall be such even number of years not exceeding six (6) years, and may be prescribed by the general assembly. The general assembly shall have power to extend existing terms of office to effect the purpose of Section 1 of this article. SECTION 4. Any vacancy which may occur in any elective state office other than that of a member of the general assembly, or of a governor, shall be filled by appointment by the governor until the next general election, and a successor elected and qualified. SECTION 5. Any vacancy which may occur in any elective county office shall be filled by the first general election for the office which is vacant, that occurs more than thirty (30) days after the occurrence of
