GOVERNORS OF OHIO



EDWARD TIFFIN—1804-1807.

Edward Tiffin, the first constitutional governor of Ohio, was born in Carlisle, England, June 19, 1776. He received a good English education and began the study of medicine, which he continued on his emigration, at the age of eighteen, to Berkeley county, Va. In 1789 he was graduated from the University of Pennsylvania. In the same year he married Mary, sister of Thomas Worthington, of Charleston, W. Va. In 1796 he manumitted his slaves and, accompanied by his brother-in-law and Robert Lucas, removed to Chillicothe. In 1802 he was chosen president of the first constitutional convention. He then became a candidate for governor, to which office he was elected in January, 1803, without opposition. Two years later he was re-elected, and the office was tendered to him a third time, but he declined. The most notable incident of his administration was the suppression of the Burr-Bleeker expedition. At the close of his second term as governor he was elected to the United States senate. In 1809 he resigned his seat in the senate, principally because of his wife's death. He died Aug. 9, 1829.
