THE ESKIMO BABY.

How the Little One in Carried and Cared for by the Mother.

From Rev. A. W. Buckland's experiences in the Arctic. The arrival in the world of the youthful Eskimo is not greeted by the orthodox cradle and swaddling clothes. Practically till he can shift for himself he lives absolute-naked inside his mother's sealskin blouse, skin to skin keeping him warm. This arrangement allows the mother to go about her work almost immediately, and she can also travel and hunt without a perambulator and without having to leave one at home to "mind" the baby. The mother's dress is almost exactly like the father's, except that it has a long sort of tail reaching to near the ground, embryo, no doubt, of the modern "train."

Spared the miseries of soap and water and early weaned to the readily swallowed diet of blubber and raw seal meat, the infant rapidly develops that invaluable layer of subcutaneous fat which, while it enhances the "jolly" appearance of the maidens, assists materially in economy in clothing. Thus in their frigid clime, once in their skin tent, the whole family will divest themselves of every stitch of clothing, unembarrassed by the fact that so many families share the tent with them. Sociability is early developed when one's next door neighbor on each side is only separated by an imaginary line between the deerskin you sleep on and the one he uses. The winter deerskin serves as bed and bedding at night and as parlor furniture during the day. Community of goods is almost imperative under this arrangement. Thus when one kills a seal all are fed, and likewise when he doesn't all go hungry together.

People Should Decide As to the Waging of War.

By ANDREW S. DRAPER, Commissioner of Education of New York State.
THE nations have come to live so closely together, the news of the world is so widely and quickly known, the mind of the world is so enlightened, THE MORAL SENSE SO STRONG, the principles of justice so widely and firmly established and, withal, war has become so mechanical and abhorrent, that it does seem as though there should be sufficient agreement among the more progressive nations to establish SOME SUBSTANTIAL FORM OF CONSTITUTIONAL PROCEDURE between as well as within the nations. It at least ought to go so far as to prevent AGGRESSIVE warfare without just cause or even with just cause without imperative need. But I am not prepared to oppose ALL warfare.
 IN MY OPINION THE DELIBERATE JUDGMENT OF AN ENLIGHTENED PEOPLE OUGHT TO HAVE ITS WAY AFTER EVERY OTHER ALTERNATIVE HAS FAILED.
 I feel bound, however, to qualify my expressions as to the need of force to uphold law and maintain sovereignty. I do not agree to the endless accretion of idle armament and UNUSABLE FORCES. The educative influence of it is bad. The surplussage of it is exactly opposed to the ONLY LEGITIMATE purpose of it.

IN CASES OF BURNS

Danger in Popular Treatment of Injuries—Hot Compress the Best Remedy That Can Be Applied.

In cases of burns death may be due first to asphyxia, secondly to shock, and thirdly to septicaemia.

The medical man seldom gets to the case in time to treat the first condition; the second is essentially a general condition; while the whole success in preventing the third depends upon the immediate local treatment. It is, therefore, the condition which must be considered here. Among the public-it is a generally accepted idea that the thing to do in the case of a burn is to dust flour over it or to cover it with oil, and, indeed, even in some comparatively late text books on surgery a mixture known as "Carron oil" is advocated.

The use of such applications cannot be too strongly deprecated, and indeed, if the lay mind could be taught that the best thing to put on a burn before the doctor is called is a hot compress which should contain some boracic acid, if there is any in the house, it is probable that the majority of deaths due to septicaemia after burns would be prevented.

For the whole aim and object of the local treatment is to prevent sepsis; flour and olive oil may be soothing and may allay the pain, but there is no antiseptic property in them; rather, they are excellent culture media for bacteria.
