## A Wild Cat Fight.

(Cedar Grove Correspondent.)  
This vicinity is occasionally vis-  
ited by the wild cat. Jacob  
Bainter recently lost two fatten-  
ing hogs, besides other damages  
done by these cats, there seems to  
be a den near the residence of Mr.  
Bainter. Last Sunday, Mr. Carl  
Blackston, an enterprising young

man, living near the No. 4 School  
house, Benton Tp., called on his  
friend, Miss Elsie Titman, who  
has been living sometime at the  
home of Mr. and Mrs. Bainter.  
Mr. Blackston and Miss Titman  
conceived the idea of going across  
the near way from Mr. Bainter's  
to Wesley Chapel church, as it  
would be a nice little drive. The  
drive to the church, which was  
about one mile, was made in  
safety. After the preaching ser-  
vice was over they started back  
the same way that they came, as  
they rode along pleasantly in the  
buggy they talked as follows,  
"What fun it would be if we were  
to meet a wild cat." Miss Tit-  
man shuddered at the thought,  
but Mr. Blackston seemed uncon-  
cerned and went on joking. When  
they got in sight of Mr. Bainter's  
home their horse became suddenly  
frightened and jumped to the side  
of the road near a fence. Mr.  
Blackston stopped the horse and  
looked to see if he could find out  
what had frightened it. In the  
meantime a wild cat had attacked  
Miss Titman, who sat on the op-  
posite side of the buggy from him-  
self. He at once secured a club  
and went to her rescue. In this  
he was successful, for the animal  
left Miss Titman, who was in the  
buggy, and sprang upon Mr.  
Blackston, who was at this time  
on the ground. As good luck  
would have it, for Miss Titman,  
the horse started off at full trot  
toward the residence of Mr. Bainter.  
Mr. Blackston's cries soon at-  
tracted the attention of Mr.  
Bainter, James Iles and Herbert  
Lovesey, who were near by, and  
were soon on the grounds with  
weapons of defense, but not till  
the cat had torn Mr. Blackston's  
clothes into atoms and lacerated  
his body in a fearful manner.

The animal was shot twice with  
a .32 caliber revolver without ef-  
fect, a shot from Mr. Bainter's  
shot gun proved successful and  
brought the animal to the earth.  
Mr. Blackston was taken to the  
home of Mr. Bainter in an uncon-  
scious condition, Dr. Melcher, of  
So. Bloomingville, was telephoned  
for, who soon after arrived and  
dressed his wounds. At this writ-  
ing he is doing well, and it is  
thought in 8 or 10 days that he  
will be able to return to his home  
at No. 4. As for Miss Titman  
the horse took her home nicely  
and she was hurt but very little.  
Miss Titman says she doesn't care  
to witness any more wild-cat  
fights.

The animal proved to be one of  
the largest of its species, the hide  
will be stuffed and left at the re-  
sidence of James Iles. Anyone

## Another Big Oil Well.

The Bremen Oil & Gas Company  
struck a "gusher" in its well No.  
4, shot Friday. The well is lo-  
cated on the Householder farm, a  
half-mile south of Avalon, this  
county. It is estimated that the  
well will be good for at least 200  
barrels per day.

The well is the biggest pro-  
ducer struck so far in the local  
field. The Bremen company has  
a 180-barrel producer and its other  
two wells pump 80 and 100 barrels  
each per day.

The company expects to develop  
its territory rapidly, and arrange-  
ments have been made to begin  
drilling on No. 6 on the Houston  
farm, and No. 6 on the Urban farm,  
the first of next week. A location  
for No. 7 was chosen today and  
work it will be started soon.

# OHIO STATE LEGISLATURE.

## The Law Makers Have Gotten Down to Work.

After the usual skirmishes of  
organization of the Legislature,  
and the appointment of committee,  
and the passing of resolutions, and  
numerous adjournments, that at-  
tend the first week of the legisla-  
ture session, the honorable law  
making body this second week are  
now getting down to business.

The following bills have been  
introduced in the senate:

Mr. Lawyer—Giving jurors \$3  
instead of \$2 per diem for service.

Mr. Arbenz—Granting relief to  
Edwin Brown of Pike county in  
the sum of \$18,000. Brown had a  
mill on the canal and the water  
gave out.

Mr. Beatty—Providing for the  
establishment of a state normal  
school at Bowling Green, Wood  
county.

Mr. Brandt—To extend the  
powers of examiners of the bureau  
of public accounting. (A resume  
of this bill appeared Tuesday  
morning in The Ohio Sun).

Mr. Beery—Prohibiting the kill-  
ing of quail in Ohio indefinitely.

Mr. Beery—Fixing the salaries  
of county commissioners on a basis  
of \$1 a thousand, where the dupli-  
cate is in excess of \$5,000,000.

Mr. Carter—To compel users of  
oil and gas wells who flow their  
water through public water  
courses, help pay for the mainte-  
nance thereof.

Mr. Duvall—Authorizing the  
commissioners of Jefferson county  
to expend \$5000 in beautifying the  
Stanton park in Steubenville.

Mr. Gayman—Making it a mis-  
demeanor for a stenographer to  
sell transcripts.

Mr. Rathburn—Allowing town-  
ship trustees to appropriate not  
to exceed \$100 a year for the relief  
of the needy poor in the township.

Mr. Harper—Making the study  
of Esperanto elective in the high  
school course.

Mr. Howe—Providing that  
municipalities may maintain parks  
and playgrounds even if the limit  
of a bond issue has to be reached.  
Senator Howe had his bill labeled  
"A real temperance measure."

Mr. Howe—Permitting cities to  
sell bonds in small denominations  
by popular subscription, so as to  
give the small money holders a  
chance to invest their surplus  
earnings.

Mr. Hunt—Providing that when  
a passenger pays and occupies the  
double lower berth in a sleeping  
car, and the upper berth is at the  
time not actually occupied, then  
the upper berth shall be closed.

Mr. Lawyer—Providing that  
county commissioners shall make  
an appropriation annually to the  
various Grand Army posts for the  
proper celebration of Memorial day.

Mr. Mahaffey—Giving county  
auditors power to name precinct  
assessors in certain cases.

Mr. Meek—Prohibiting members  
of the state board of school ex-  
aminers from accepting remunera-  
tion for services as teachers and  
lecturers before county teachers'  
institutes.

Mr. Pollock—Providing for a  
commission of six to codify the  
mining laws.

Mr. Pollock—Making it a mis-  
demeanor for any person to neglect  
to feed or water the horse he has  
hired once in six hours.

Mr. Pollock—To establish a  
police court in the city of Canton,  
said court to be one of record.

Mr. Schmidt—Giving city  
councils the right to compel steam  
and electric cars to stop at street  
crossings and regulating their  
speed.

Mr. Schmidt—Providing that  
boards of education shall set aside  
from the contingent fund a sum  
not to exceed five cents for each  
pupil enumerated, said money to  
be distributed monthly to the  
members of the board of education  
in equal proportions as their com-  
pensation.

Mr. Ward—Making it unlawful  
for any person to engage in the  
insurance business unless author-  
ized by the state.

Mr. Ward—Making a reduction  
of \$10 daily from the pay of a
