LAYING OF CORNER STONE

New Church is Being Erected at Laurelville.

The laying of the corner stone of the new and modern cement block M. E. Church, last Thursday, was one of the very important historical events of Laurelville. The impressive services were very largely attended. Presiding Elders, Dr. Cook, of Chillicothe, and Dr. Cherrington, of Lancaster, and Rev. Stone, of Kingston, Rev. Blair, of Tarlton, Rev. Landsettle, of Adelphia, assisted Rev. George Creamer, the father of the church, in the services. There were three special services. The morning services were conducted by presiding Elder, Dr. Cook. The afternoon services by Revs. Blair, and Landsettle, and the evening services, the dedication sermon, by Dr. Cherrington. In the evening donations were suggested by Rev. Creamer, with extreme flattering results, more than \$500 being subscribed.

The church will be rapidly pushed to completion, and when finished will be one of the finest edifices of the kind, considering membership, in Ohio. The thanks of the entire community, regardless of religious affiliations are due to Reverend Creamer for his untiring and gratuitous work. On the completion of the church a minister will be selected, and at a very handsome salary.

On Sunday evening, Mrs. John Westlake died suddenly going from the home of Jesse Voris to her own home. She had been attending to her usual happy duty of caring for the little children of Mr. and Mrs. Voris that day. She loved these little babies and was at the Voris home about all day Sunday, as Mrs. Voris is sick. In the evening she started through the alley to her home and became suddenly and violently ill. Mrs. "Tuck" Dollison met her in the alley and saw that the woman was very ill. She called assistance and got her into Mrs. Dollison's home, where her husband and a physician were called, but in a few minutes Mrs. Westlake expired. The cause of death was said to be apoplexy. She was a fleshy woman, kind hearted and self-sacrificing, beloved by all who knew her. Her bereaved husband has the sympathy of our people. She had one son, Dudley.

The funeral occurred from the U. B. church Wednesday, Rev. Willis officiating.

MRS. MIKE KRAUSS.

On Tuesday evening Mrs. Mike Krauss died at her home in Logan on High street. She was a young woman of but 24 years, and had been married but three years. Her husband is a railroad man. They have two children, a little girl 16 months old and an infant boy 2 months old. The cause of her death was cancer of the stomach. She was a daughter of Mike Prainor, of Nelsonville. The funeral was held at the Catholic Church this morning and interment will be held in Columbus this afternoon.

JOHN W. TRITSCH.

Last evening at about 7:30 o'clock, Mr. John W. Tritsch fell dead upon our streets of heart failure. He had gone for his mail, and passing through Bolt's drug store went out the Market street entrance toward the post-office. He fell on the side walk near the door, where he was found a few minutes later by Attorney H. M. Whitcraft. He was carried into the drug store and a physician summoned, but death claimed him in a few minutes. The news came as an awful shock to his many friends, and as we go to press to-day, arrangements for his funeral have not been made.

MRS. ISAAC STIERS.

Mrs. Isaac Stiers, the aged mother of I. N. and J. A. Stiers, died at the home of the latter, Wednesday morning. She was 87 years old, and many years a resident of Logan. She was one of Logan's most noble women. An attack of acute stomach trouble attendant on old age was the cause of her death, after but a brief sickness. The funeral will be held from the home Friday afternoon.

HOMER KLINKER.

On Friday of last week occurred the death of Homer Klinker, 17 years, son of George Klinker in West Logan. The young man had been working at Will Lehman's on Big Pine in this county, and took down sick with the typhoid fever, with complications of brain trouble. They brought him home at Logan and he died within a week. A short service was held at the home Monday, and the remains were taken to Putnam county for burial. The family have lived in Logan only a year.

EVA J. (HULS) RUDOLPH.

Eva Jane Rudolph, daughter of William H. and Elizabeth Huls, was born May 24, 1873, at Rockbridge, O., and died in the hospital at Marion, Friday night, April 17. Her constant waiting on her husband, who died last June from locomotor ataxia, brought on her fatal illness. She underwent an operation for appendicitis in Lancaster in December, from which she never fully recovered. The funeral was held from the M. E. church at Sugar Grove, interment in the Sugar Grove cemetery by the side of her husband. She leaves one son Willie, aged eleven years, father, two sisters, Mrs. P. D. Sloan of Logan, and Mrs. H. B. Troxel of Rockbridge, and two brothers, William M. Huls of San Bernardino, Cal., and A. E. Huls, of Logan.

INFANT CHILD.

On Wednesday morning occurred the death of the infant child of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Harsh, at the home on east Hunter street. The little one was but a few weeks old. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at the home.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF OHIO.

JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the state of Ohio relative to the passage of bills.

Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Ohio:

SECTION 1. A proposition shall be submitted to the electors of this state at the next election for members of the general assembly, to amend the constitution of the state of Ohio so that sections 18 to 22, both inclusive, of article II shall respectively be numbered as sections 19 to 23, and sections 15 and 18 of such article be so amended as to read as follows:

ARTICLE II.
Sec. 19. Every bill shall be fully and distinctly read on three different days, unless, in case of urgency, three-fourths of the members elected to the house in which it shall be pending, shall dispense with this rule; but the reading of a bill on its final passage shall be read or amended, unless the new act contain more than one subject, which shall be clearly expressed in its title, and the foregoing is a simplified copy of the section or sections so amended shall so read as follows:

Sec. 18. Every bill passed by the general assembly shall, before it can become a law, be presented to the governor for his approval. If he approves, he shall sign it; if he does not approve it, he shall send it with his objections to the house in which it originated which may then reconsider the vote on its passage. If two-thirds of the members elected to that house then agree to re-pass the bill, it shall go sent, with the objections of the governor, to the other house which may also reconsider the vote on its passage. If two-thirds of the members elected to that house then agree to re-pass it, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the objections of the governor. If a bill shall not be returned by the governor within ten days, Sundays excepted, after being presented to him, it shall become a law, unless the general assembly by adjournment prevent its return; in which case, it shall become a law unless, within ten days after such adjournment, it shall be filed by him, with his objections, in the office of the secretary of state. The governor may disapprove any item or items in any bill making an appropriation of money, and the item or items, so disapproved, shall be stricken therefrom, unless re-passed in the manner herein prescribed for the re-passing of a bill.

Sec. 2. This amendment shall take effect on the first day of January, A. D. 1909.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF OHIO.

JOINT RESOLUTION

To amend sections 18 and 19, inclusive, of the Constitution of Ohio.

Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the state of Ohio:

SECTION 1. That a proposition shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Ohio on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1908, to amend section two of article two of the constitution of the state of Ohio, so that it shall read as follows:

FINANCE AND TAXATION.
Sec. 2. The General Assembly shall have power to make and alter an equitable and just system for raising state and local revenue. It may classify the subjects of taxation so far as their differences justify the same in order to secure a just return therefrom. All taxes and other levies shall be imposed for public purposes only and shall be just to each subject. The power of taxation shall never be surrendered, suspended or contracted away. Bonds of the state of Ohio, bonds of any city, village, township or township of this state, and bonds issued in behalf of the public schools of Ohio and the income of instruction in connection therewith, during the term of public school houses, houses used exclusively for public worship, institutions of purely public charity, public property used exclusively for any public purpose, and personal property to an amount not exceeding five value \$200, for each individual, may, by general laws, be exempted from taxation, but all such laws shall be subject to alteration or repeal; and the value of all property, so exempted, shall be from time to time ascertained and published as may be directed by law.

SECTION 2. All taxes and exemptions in force when this amendment is adopted shall remain in force, in the same manner and to the same extent, until and until otherwise directed by statute.

SECTION 1. A proposition shall be submitted to the electors of this state at the next election for members of the general assembly to amend section 25 of article II of the constitution, so as to read as follows:

Sec. 25. The regular session of each general assembly shall commence on the first Monday in January next after it is chosen.

THE VILLAGE COUNCIL.

The most important matter coming before the village council Tuesday night was the receiving and opening of bids for lighting the village of Logan.

The Citizen's Electric Light Co's contract with Logan expires in June next and it is time to think it over. The council street and lighting committee advertised for bids and received but one, that of the present lighting company. It proposed a ten year contract at \$80.00 per light per year on a basis of 50 lights. (Logan

has now 43 lights) also \$75 per year each for 60 lights and \$72 per year each for 75 lights. The bid was referred to the lighting committees for report at next meeting.

It is expressed by many persons that the bid proposed is very fair. The present price is \$85.00 per light, and the offer now is \$80.00 per light, a difference of \$2500 on a ten years contract, taking a 50 light basis. The present company have furnished good service, and their contract is an all night run. Some towns are getting lighting cheaper than we, but are on moon-light schedule or are not giving the strong service required. We have faith in the Logan council that they will work out the problem to the best interests of the town.
