Death Calls R. S. Quigley.

[Tuesday Columbus Press.] R. S. Quigley former superintendent of the Hocking Valley railroad, died at his home, 137 Hubbard avenue, this afternoon at 12:40 from diabetes. The deceased was 43 years of age, and has been a resident of Columbus for several years.

Mr. Quigley first entered railway service when he was seventeen years of age as telegraph operator, on the Bee line railway at Larue. Later he associated with the Cleveland, Lorain and Wheeling, now a system of the B. & O., and then was made dispatcher of the Chicago and Eastern. In 1892 he became connected with the Hocking Valley, as chief clerk in the superintendent's office.

After that he was advanced to trainmaster of the Hocking division, and later on the entire road. His later promotion followed soon after, but he was not permitted to serve the road very long in that capacity, on account of the sickness that came upon him. He retired the first of last May, when H. E. Speaks, the present superintendent succeeded him.

Mr. Quigley was a member of St. Francis Church, and was well known in Catholic circle. He is survived by a widow, two girls, Frances and Helen, and four boys, Peter, Norbert, Jerome and Clarence, and his aged mother, who resides in Marion.
