### Council Proceedings.

On Tuesday night the village council held their regular month-end session, and they were beset with petitions and petitioners.

Mr. George Risley was before them with a very sensible proposition that is also a problem. North Orchard street is not straight with the world and Mr. Risley wants it straightened. He has property on that street and is glad to assist the city so far as his land is concerned, but there are other real estate owners along the line that are not so generous. This matter was referred to the Street committee.

Mr. Ed Clark was present with a petition asking for a light at the top of the hill on Hill street, as was also Mr. Blosser, asking a light placed at Goose Creek bridge on the Zansville Road. These petitions were referred to the Street committee.

That momentous question of water supply then came dancing up with its usual blare, but the council put it up to the Water Works trustees this time. It is high-buck or low-doe, and the trustees must name the toss. The council passed a resolution asking the Water Works trustees to submit plans and specifications for additional water supply and proposed extensions, and that when such are submitted, the council will proceed to provide for such plans and estimates. Let the Water Works board now get busy.

Attorney E. D. Ricketts, representing Mr. Charles McCarty wanted to know if the village council propose to empty another sewer into the river near his house as shown by the survey and plans by which the work is being prosecuted on the Riverdale Addition sewer construction. The council insist that it is nobody's concern where that sewer is going to empty, until it does empty, there is no possibility of getting an injunction sustained until there is something to enjoin. There is not a stream polluted by putting the end of a clean sewer pipe into it. There must be evidence by the experience a smelling committee that there is actual pollution. The council committee reported that they have visited, in dry weather, the mouth of the main sewer that already empties into the river near the McCarty residence, and that no offensiveness comes from that source. That there are city dumping grounds and a slaughter house near, that furnish all the cause for complaint. The final outcome will probably be that the court and a jury will needs "view the premises" and sniff the zephyrs there abouts to ascertain if the grounds for fire complaint are well taken.

Fire Chief Wm. Waner was present, and said that while the city council is preparing to assist the supply end of the fire fighting, it is well to look to the other end. That he has practically no fire team. It seems that a committee on fire department of a former council "borrowed" a team of Mr. Ditto, a horse dealer of Perry County, and one of the said horses has been in the hospital ever since the burr was removed from its tail. The original cost of the team, yet unpaid, was \$500.00, and the manuring and massage, along with extra livery hire has put four figures of cost on the wrong side of the ledger. The committee on fire department of which Mr. Braddock is chairman was given power to clean up the fire team problem once for all and get a new team if necessary. Mr. Braddock is the man for the place. He has had a life time experience with horses and will unravel that muddle and come out with a good team, with as little cost as possible.

An ordinance was passed authorizing City Solicitor Whitcraft to proceed to prosecute the acceptance into the village of that part of Mingo Terrace addition to Logan that now lies outside of the corporation line. Under suspended rules another ordinance was passed taking in the afore mentioned tract. The next proceeding will be to accept the addition as a whole as platted, and then pass a grade ordinance. That addition to Logan is a comer. The council also authorized the clerk to advertise for bids for a depository for the village funds. The advertisement appears elsewhere in this issue, also the ordinances passed.

### AN ORDINANCE

Accepting application for annexation of territory.

Be it ordained by the Council of the Village of Logan, State of Ohio:—

SEC. 1. That the application of D. A. Kennell and T. E. Warren for the annexation of the following described territory, to-wit: the County of Hocking and State of Ohio, and adjacent to the Village of Logan, to-wit: being situate in Section 14 and 15 of township No. 15, range No. 17, beginning at the north-west corner of lot No. 17, of the Village of Logan, Ohio; thence north fifteen degrees and 30 minutes, east 27 feet to the west side of the Public Highway thence south 29 degrees, 30 minutes, east 27 feet to the north corner of line of said Village of Logan, Ohio; thence west with the said north line of said Village of Logan, to the place of beginning.

### AN ORDINANCE.

To authorize annexation of certain territory to the Village of Logan, Ohio.

Be it ordained by the Council of the Village of Logan, State of Ohio:—

SEC. 1.
